

Bridge

The Swiss Team event is one of the most popular events at a bridge tournament. John Hamilton, a National tournament director from Columbus, Ohio, and Marc Low, of Dayton, Ohio, developed the present method. It consists of dividing the team event into short matches. After the first match, losers play losers and winners play winners.

Usually the team-play right matches in order to reduce the field to one undefeated team. They are scored by international match points or IMPs — a method of scoring to reduce all boards to equal status.

The hand in the diagram was played earlier this month at the North American championship in Salt Lake City. At

one table South didn't believe East and bid two spades to expose the psychic bid. He then decided to bid five diamonds over four hearts. West was sure his partner's spade values were useless so he doubled.

North-South lost 800 points when the contract was defeated three tricks. When the hand was played at the second table, South again rebid the suit East had opened, only this time it was conventional. West bid four hearts. East bid six. South doubled.

All 13 tricks were taken, so when the board was replayed North-South were minus 1310 points or a difference of 510 equal to 11 IMPs.

Mayor Coleman A. Young issued a proclamation stating that Mrs. Whitby has served as a member of the National Urban League, the Detroit Council of Churches, the American Association of Social Workers, and the Michigan Welfare League.

Mrs. Whitby worked her way through the ranks to become a case work supervisor for the Detroit Department of Public Welfare and was later promoted to head the Alfred District, at that time Detroit's largest welfare office.
