The Farmington Community Center will benefit from theater-goers who choose to see "I Do! 'I Do!" in the Botsford Inn on March 27.

A portion of each dinner theater ticket purchased for the Sunday night performance of the Broadway musical will be put into the fund drive the center is holding during March. The month has been dubbed by both Farmington and Farmington Hills Councils as "Farmington Community Month."

An elaborate buffet dinner is served at 5 p.m., followed by the show, at 7:30 p.m.

"I Do! 'I Do!" is now in its second month's run in the Botsford Inn Coach House, located on Grand River, north of Eight Mile. It is playing to large and enthusiastic audiences.

The play is a warm, comic and tenuous journey through 50 years of marriage.

Edgar A. Guest III directs the stars of the two member cast, Phil Marcus Esser and Nancy Gurwin.

Students named have achieved at least a 3.4 grade point average while carrying a minimum course load of 12 semester credit hours.

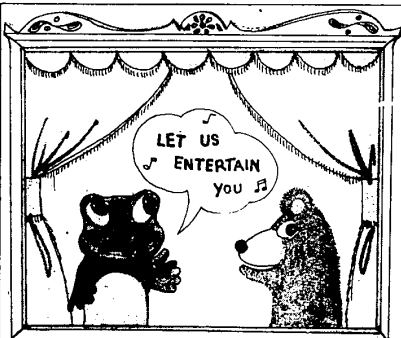
EMS display at mall

The first local display and demonstration on emergency medical services (EMS) is being held at Orchard Mall through Saturday.

Sponsored by the West Bloomfield-Farmington Area League of Women Voters, the display will describe the components of an EMS system and how it can save lives. The system puts trained medical technicians on the road to offer emergency services at the scene and en route to a hospital. It is estimated that EMS could prevent 200-300 coronary deaths and 25-30 traffic deaths each year in Oakland County.

On Saturday at the Orchard Lake-Maple mall, Gordon Degner of Motorola Communications and Electronics Inc. will demonstrate emergency equipment seen on NBC TV's "Emergency." This will include an "orange box," the vital communication system between the accident scene and hospital.

Also on display will be an electro-cardiograph machine to take EKGs and a defibrillator used to shock the heart. An ambulance from Fleet Ambulance Service will also be on display.
