SERMON—
"THE HEALING SHADOW"
"They brought for the sick into the streets that the shadow of Peter passing might overshadow some of them." Acts 5:15.

James M. Barrie causes Peter Pan to weep because he had no shadow. In the story briefly told above, we have a Peter who had a wonderful shadow; in it there was healing as soft as the touch of the dawn. News had rapidly spread that a man was coming in whose heart was the spirit of Jesus.

Row after row of sick, sightless, diseased, depressed, helpless but hopeful people gathered to see him. At last he comes! His slowly moving shadow falls lightly upon them. Lo, it is a healing shadow! Its soft touch transforms these helpless people into leaping, laughing folks. A new inrush of life, a new birth of health is theirs.

The shadow of Peter is the symbol of the unconscious influence which follows character as the shadow follows the sun. No life is without its influence. Its silent touch is for good or ill. We sometimes forget that the thing we do and know not that what we do is among the major

A jail sentence or reform school for a theft was the old method which failed as a corrective measure. A flogging for a lie was deemed the proper thing, but has proven a tragic failure.

The solution of the problem of youthful delinquency is now confidently sought through methods put in practice by the judge in the Colorado court, his ideas being quite generally adopted by individuals, societies and organizations dealing with the boy problem.

The judge says that in dealing with a boy or girl offender that the first thing to ascertain is why the child lied or committed the specific offense. It will be found in many instances, he says, that the offender was not entirely to blame. In order to secure a permanent settlement of the child, responsibility must be established and corrective measures applied where needed. Past methods of police departments, parents and teachers have in a great measure added to child delinquency. While the methods were intended to be corrective they have in many cases resulted in producing just the opposite effect.

It is the duty of officials, parents and teachers to ascertain in advance of punishment of the child, the reasons whether the boy is instinctively criminal or has been tempted to commit the offense as a means of gratifying a natural desire for innocent pleasures denied him through home conditions.

A fixed and inflexible rule of punishment for youthful offenders will not work the desired reformation. The Lindsey method of studying the boy, his environments and motive back of the offense promises much.

No star ever rose and set,
But had influence somewhere,
No life can be pure in its passion
And strong in its strife,
And all life not be purer and
stronger thereby."

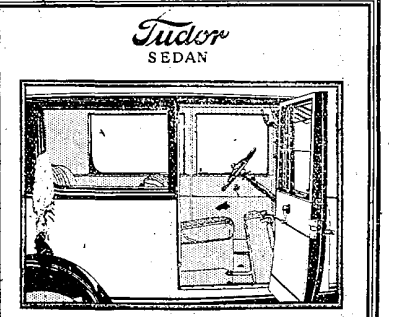
