Former police chief dies

Joseph Devriendt, Sr., who served as chief of police in Farmington for 22 years until 1964, died Saturday at the Beverly Manor Nursing Home in Novi. He was 82.
City Manager Robert Deadman ordered flags flown at half mast in Farmington yesterday to honor the civic leader.
Devriendt served in the Michigan National Guard and was a veteran of World War I, for which he won a Victory Medal with five stars.
He joined the Michigan State Constabulary in 1919 and spent 19 months serving in various communities, including Farmington, Plymouth and Ypsilanti.
During the Depression, he was hired as a deputy sheriff and was appointed chief of police in 1942. He retired in 1964.
Devriendt also served as commander of the American Legion, Barracks 1152.
Services were held yesterday at the Heenev-Sundquist Funeral Home with the Rev. Jean D. Cronin of Our Lady of Sorrows Church in Farmington officiating.
Burial was at Oakwood Cemetery, Farmington.
He is survived by his wife, Helen; son Joseph Jr.; stepchildren Homer Elsonford and Dorothy Hatch Montour; seven grandchildren; and three great grandchildren.
