

Hawks take 5th in Western Six

Two third-place relays. That's the best Farmington Harrison's girls' track team could come up with at the Western Six League meet it hosted Wednesday.

Cocher Mark Babcock's Harrison squad scored 25 points to finish fifth in the six-team circuit. Livonia Churchill won the league championship by scoring 188 points at the league meet.

Walled Lake Western was second with 163, Waterford Mott had 41, Plymouth Canton 33 and Northville 12.

Harrison's 1,600-meter relay (Patty Turton, Carol Kopko, Sandy Oswald and Kim Mitchell) finished third in a 4:22.55, and the Hawks' 400-meter relay (Janine Claus, Mitchell, Dee Dowell and Jenny Tompson) took third in a

season-best 54.07.

Dowell earned a third place in the 200-meter hurdles with a time of 33.17. Harrison's 800 relay (Turton, Kopko, Mitchell and Tompson) landed fourth in 1:55.77. Tompson finished fifth in the 100 dash (13.27) and sixth in the 200 dash (28.89).

Churchill's Tina Cieszkowski won the 200 (26.75), the 100 (12.55) and took a third in the long jump (15-10 $\frac{1}{2}$). Teammate Chris Kendrick won the 100 hurdles (15.86) and the 200 hurdles (32.35).

Western's Judy Yuhn was another double winner, taking the 800 run (2:28.83) and the 1,600 run (5:26.59). Western's Gloria Glagola set the meet's only record — a 12:09.89 effort in the 3,200-meter run.

BOH offers record prize money

When the Bloomfield Open Hunt Club (BOH) presents its annual back-to-back horse shows for hunters and jumpers this month, prize distribution will reach a record \$92,000, according to General Chairman Charles A. Walby.

Included will be 11 days of competition — the Motor City Show running June 10-14 and the Detroit Show June 16-21.

"Not only is this the most ever offered by BOH in more than half a century of horse show sponsorship, but our North American Grand Prix for Olympic-level jumpers will offer an all-time

high of \$20,000 by itself," Walby said.

"It's the richest single event in Michigan's horse world away from the race tracks. The quality of riders and mounts being entered from throughout the United States tells us this may be our greatest show ever."

Heading the entries already received from United States Equestrian Team members is that of Melanie Smith of Stonington, Conn. The 1980 Horsewoman-of-the-Year is bringing Calypso, the jumper with whom she won the Grand Prix of France.

The USET's Katie Monahan, now of

Upperville, Va., went from childhood stardom at the BOH to international acclaim and has notified officials that she'll be returning with horses from the R.J. Reynolds string.

MORE THAN 500 horses will be stabled at BOH during the shows. Three rings will be in almost constant use each day beginning at 9 a.m. Evening performances, beginning at 7:30 p.m., are scheduled June 12, 13, 18, 19 and 20.

When the curtain finally falls, nearly 2,000 ribbons and dozens of treasured

trophies will have been presented in well over 100 categories of competition at all age levels.

Admission is \$3 for daytime shows and \$4 for the night performances. The parking fee is \$2 per car.

Walby's key aides are Alvin Blechman, chairman of the Motor City Show, and John P. Ivory II, Detroit Show chairman.

strokes on himself.

"Joe was the most easy-going guy you ever met in your life. He wasn't a bit temperamental."

Not even, said Nelson, when it came to being excluded from private golf clubs because he was black.

"He didn't have a biased bone in his body," he said. "Louis never said a word about it one way or the other."

"He may have played a few private clubs, but he didn't go around from club to club playing with different pros as people suggest."

"Most of the time, he played Rackham, Rouge and Warren Valley."

"LOUIS WASN'T into golf's social scene. He wasn't a drinker or a jokster at all," Nelson said. "He was quiet, reserved and very humble. He'd only make reference to his fights when asked."

Once, after he knocked out Tami Mauriello (in 1946) after two or three rounds, I heard someone ask him, "Hey Joe, how come you didn't get him in one?" Joe just said, "I beat him, didn't I?"

"He was very humble — and a guy you could trust."

"The way people respected him and the way people felt about him made his life. He couldn't create a facade."

"He was a great, warm human being."
