Adoption information given in open meeting

The next adoption information meeting sponsored by 10 tri-county agencies will begin at 7 p.m. Wednesday, July 22, in Detroit's Catholic Social Services, 9851 Hamilton. Ben Frazier, WDW anchorman, will be master of ceremonies.

Frazier, who did a series on adoption for his station earlier this year, says he was appalled to learn that hundreds of black school-age children are not yet adopted. "Some of them have been waiting for years," he says. "Childhood is too short and too vital to let it speed by without the nurturing of loving parents."

Slides of children waiting for homes will be shown at the meeting and their social workers will describe them briefly. Following the meeting the social workers will answer questions and talk with interested persons.

Addie Williams, adoption specialist for Wayne County Department of Social Services, will explain the basics of the adoption process. A 20-minute film, "Everybody Needs a Forever Home," will open the meeting.

New children come into the child care system every week as courts remove children from their biological parents because of neglect or abuse. Sometimes a parent voluntarily surrenders all rights to a child, feeling it is in the child's best interest to be adopted.

Some of the children are ready-made families; brothers and sisters who want to be adopted together. In such cases, as with medical handicaps, adoption subsidy is available to meet expenses.
