Extend Tree Bargain

FARMINGTON
 The deadline to order trees from the City of Farmington has been extended and residents now have until the morning of March 16, but no later.

The City Beautification Committee has decided to order 180 trees for the spring planting, including 120 Norway maples, 40 Imperial locusts and 20 pin oaks.

The order includes a small surplus in each category to cover for late orders.

City Manager John Dinan says bids are being taken March 14 and the contract will be awarded March 16. Orders may be received up to the time the contract is awarded.

Cost of trees is \$20 each if planted on public right-of-way by the DPW. Homeowners doing their own planting on private property are paying \$14 per tree.

Trees will be delivered for planting in mid-April.

Bernard By Victim Of Bulldozer
