Hills woman dies in auto accident

Ruth Earlene Paul, 56, of Ridgewood Drive in Farmington Hills, was killed Oct. 30 when a car in which she was a passenger collided with another vehicle at 12 Mile and Farmington Roads. The car in which Paul died was driven by Jacqueline Grett of Farmington Hills, who was uninjured. Police said the accident happened at 12:30 a.m. when Grett proceeded into the intersection after stopping for a flashing red signal. Her car was struck by a car traveling eastbound on 12 Mile Road. Paul was pronounced dead at 1:26 a.m. by an Oakland County medical ex-

aminer. The cause of death was listed as multiple traumatic injuries. Renee Plant, 17, of Milford, a passenger in the eastbound vehicle, sustained facial injuries, according to Lt. Ernest Miller of the Farmington Hills Police Department. She was treated and released from Bolsoford General Hospital. The driver of the eastbound vehicle, Terril Galea of Redford Township, broke an ankle, Miller said. She also was treated and released from Bolsoford's emergency room. Galea was passing through a yellow

flashing light on 12 Mile and had the right of way, according to Miller. Road conditions that night were described by Miller as good, cloudy and dry. Paul, a homemaker, resided in Farmington Hills for 10 years. She is

survived by a daughter, Janis L. Paul, and a son, Jack E. Paul of Arlington, Virginia. Funeral services were Nov. 2 at Our Lady of Sorrows Catholic Church. Burial was in Holy Sepulchre cemetery.
