Is A Retirement Development In Making For Farmington?

FARMINGTON A Farmington doctor, who also happens to own a nursing home, foresees that a retirement village will be located in Farmington within the next five years.

Dr. Edwin Blumberg described a retirement village Tuesday to 40 senior citizens at the Farmington Community Center.

As Blumberg explains it, a retirement village is several facilities located on a plot of 50 acres or more providing integrated and combined care satisfying all needs of a large group of elderly residents.

The doctor has visited retirement villages in Florida he said: "The whole idea is you're living-not just existing in some building somewhere."

He added: "Within five years, I predict there'll be several units, of this type in the Farmington area."

"One of the senior citizens remarked it would be tough to find 50 vacant acres in the Farmington area right now).

THE PROJECT WOULD, include provision for extended care, skilled care and basic care, as well as apartments or condominiums. All located on landscaped grounds with a fringe of limited commercial establishments.

"In the old days," he said, "it was the accepted thing for you to stay with the family. What few hospitals there were, were places people went to die. "Nursing homes didn't even exist and the few old-age homes were run by the state

being built into senior citizens housing.

These include: Bathrooms with assist bats, wide doorways for wheelchairs, ramps instead of stairs, door handles instead of door knobs.

Blumberg also detailed the low interest rate a builder can get on U.S. government loans if he specifies an apartment is restricted to tenants 62 or over.
