FARMINGTON AS A CITY OF FIFTH CLASS

One of the most progressive movements started in Farmington in some time is the proposed change in our municipal form of government. For years this community has been working under the handicap of an obsolete charter divided for villages of an early date. Some years ago the unpracticability of the old village charter was recognized by the legislature and a new one was enacted that better fitted the requirements. In order to make the new charter operative it was necessary for a village to elect to come under it. As Farmington never so elected the village has been working under the old charter.

With the changes that have been made during the past decade and that are continually taking place, the necessity for a new charter is now pressing. For obvious reasons it is deemed best to incorporate under a city charter of the fifth class.

With a city charter Farmington will elect a municipal justice of the peace and fines for violations of ordinances will go into the city treasury. As the village is now at considerable expense in providing police protection it seems but just and proper that moneys from fines should be used to help defray this expense.

Petitions asking the council to submit to the electors the question of incorporating as a city of the fifth class are now being circulated and no trouble is anticipated in securing a sufficient number of names to it. The territory to be incorporated being identical with that of the present village the question of the change is one for the council and village electors to decide.

HOME COMFORTS REFLECTED

"Home is where the heart is," is a definition largely tinged with sentiment, but it none the less true. Many a resident of this community bears a strong affection for this community because for him it holds all that is dear to him. It is resolved that he will let nothing undone that may make the community a better town, so that his home and those who are in it may be surrounded by all the loving care that he can bestow on them.

On the other hand, the man who is a wanderer is without abiding interest in any town. Nothing holds him to this or that place, and it is of little consequence to him whether he resides here or at the next place.

The ties of home are stronger than any material ties. "Home" is merely a name, like "country," but, any husband and father will pour out his last drop of blood in fighting for either. Never was a greater truth propounded than when the poet wrote:

"Be it ever so humble,
There's no place like home."
You cannot translate it into terms of money, for the means that may breathe more the true spirit of home than the richest palace.

When you talk to a hard-headed business man about such intangible things as "love" and "patriotism" you have to "show him." Mere words do not go very far when it comes to a matter of separating him from his money, yet no man who maintains a home and does not neglect those in it need hesitate about approaching such a business man for an extension of credit in case of necessity. Surprisingly large sums are advanced on a small amount of tangible security to a man building a home because such a man is a good "moral hazard."

The men who own their homes are the backbone of such a community as ours. They must own them because the business of renting habitations to others, which has been largely developed in big cities, has happily not spread to communities the size of ours. The home-owning citizen is the bulwark of the nation. The nations of Europe in which Bolshevism is unable to make any headway are those in which the people own their own homes, while the ones in which its ravages are greatest are those where throughout the years it has been impossible for them to acquire even so

little property as this. The scourge, therefore, has had little menace for the United States, because so many people can own their own homes, or if they do not own them, they know they can any time they want to, and nothing is to be gained through violence on others in the possessor-class. This is of great significance to our community. If we want our community to be a city of homes, owned by those occupying them, we must provide the magnet to attract them, and this is the independence of a town that is largely self-sufficient, that patronizes its home merchants and that owns no divided allegiance to a distant metropolis, is just what provides this attraction.

COVENTRY GARDENS HAS MANY HOME ATTRACTIVE

A new home community known as Coventry Gardens has just been opened at the intersection of Five Mile and Farmington roads. It is anticipated that this new residence section will develop quite rapidly because it is strategically located with reference to the Ford plants at Highland Park and River Rouge. The five mile road leads directly to Highland Park, while the new Fordson Highway, which runs through Coventry Gardens, will form a direct route to the River Rouge plant.

Looking forward to the time when this new section will be fully populated, the owner and subdivisor has taken steps to insure the property being provided with permanent outdoor recreational facilities such as few communities possess—a generous size park for the use of home owners as a picnic ground and children's playground.

A twenty-acre natural park, with wooded slopes and a meandering brook, has been set aside and beautified by rustic bridges and benches. Tables, outdoor stoves, swings and other equipment such has usually found in children's playgrounds are now being provided so that, when the work is completed, Shoreham Park, as it is called, will be an ideal pleasure spot for home owners in this new section of suburban development.

Each lot owner in Coventry Gardens will be presenting with a club membership entitling him and his family to the privilege of using the park not only after, but also before that time, for picnic purposes, if he so desires. The ideals which prompted the owner of the property to inaugurate the idea of a community recreational center are reflected also in other features of the property, notably the winding drives, which follow the natural contour of the land, and the generous size lots which provide ample space for lawns and gardens.

That the character of the homes in Coventry Gardens will be in harmony with the distinction of the property in the respects already noted, is insured by the fact that careful restrictions will be made as to the types of homes to be erected. While the prices of the homes will embrace a wide latitude, their general character will be such as to make the new home community one of the most attractive garden spots of Greater Detroit. The subdivision will be provided with all city improvements, including sewers, water, electricity and sidewalks.
