WHAT TO DO WHEN BITTEN BY RABID ANIMALS

A pamphlet issued by Dr. Herbert W. Emerson of the Pasteur Institute at Ann Arbor, contains a definite statement of information for those who may be bitten by rabid dogs, and in this territory so infected, we pass the information along. It says:

"Whenever anyone is bitten by a dog or cat, if the bite is on the face or the body other than the face, have the animal tied up securely and watched for ten days. If the dog or cat remains apparently normal during this time there will be no danger to the individual so far as rabies is concerned.

"When one is bitten by a dog or cat and the bite is on the face and the action of the animal suggests that it has rabies, the animal should be killed. Its head cut off and packed in a tin container surrounded by ice and then by sawdust and sent at once to the Pasteur Institute at Ann Arbor.

"It is always desirable for the patient bitten to go at once to a physician and have the bites cauterized with hnitric acid. The average time elapsing from the time a person is bitten until symptoms develop is several weeks in bites on the body and extremities, and two or three weeks in bites on the

face or head. The Pasteur treatments must be started therefore very early in bites on the face and head as the protection thus given to the patient is greatest soon after the treatments are completed and these treatments require three weeks. It is also desirable to get the treatments started early in bites on the extremities or body but one can wait here if the wounds are well cauterized at once and make sure whether the animal has rabies or not.

"Rabies is markedly on the increase in Michigan and it would be desirable to require all dogs to be leashed or muzzled for six months and put a strict quarantine on dogs coming into this state from other states and thus control the spread of the disease and practically stamp it out."

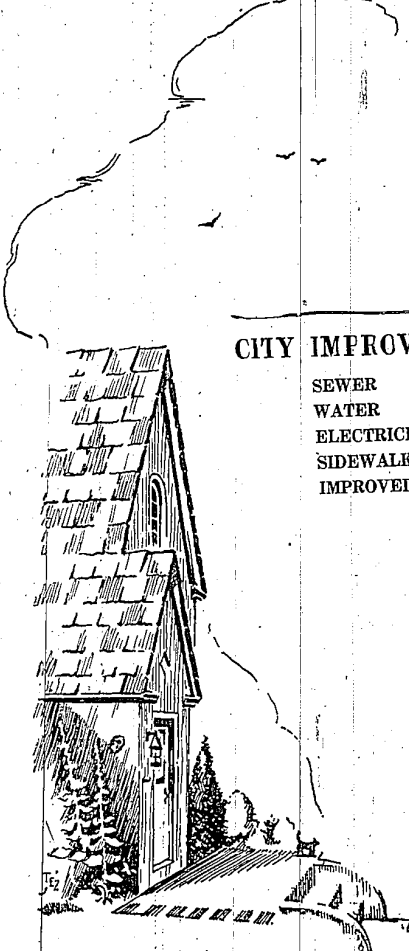
