

Children's Concerts Feature Exploration

This season the Detroit Symphony Orchestra's Young People's Concerts will explore the worlds of ballet, opera and pantomime in addition to presenting selections from the classic symphonic repertoire. The concerts will be given on four Saturdays in two series — at 11 a.m. and at 2 p.m., in Ford Auditorium, Detroit.

Pierre Hétu, the symphony's associate conductor, will conduct the opening concert, "Pictures and Stories in Music," on Oct. 24. The program will present Poulenc's musical adaptation of "Babar the Elephant" complete with screen illustrations, as well as works by Beethoven, Schuller and Mussorgsky.

On Dec. 5 the Severo Ballet Company will perform Tchaikovsky's "Nutcracker" ballet in a Christmas concert, again with Hétu on the podium.

The Pantomime Circus will join conductor-in-residence Paul Freeman on Jan. 30 in a concert entitled "Is the March an Art?" The program will feature works by Elgar, Gershwin, Tchaikovsky and Johann Strauss.

The Michigan premiere of Menotti's space-age opera for children, "Help! Help! The Globlinks," will be presented on March 27. Produced by David d'Chiara, director of Detroit's Overture to Opera Company, the program will be conducted by Hétu.

Season tickets may be ordered from the Ford Auditorium Box Office at \$4.85, and after Sept. 8 single tickets will be available at Hudson's and Grinnell's, as well as at the Ford Auditorium box office.

U-M Pianist Has Eventful Tour

ANN ARBOR — University of Michigan professor Georgy Sandor, internationally known pianist who will be the featured soloist in an all-Russian program at Meadow Brook Sunday, Aug. 9, has just returned from a crisis-filled tour of Latin America.

He performed for Bartok Festival in Guatemala, Lima and Rio de Janeiro, in the face of earthquakes in Peru, the German ambassador's kidnaping in Brazil, a coup d'état in Equador, and the assassination of the former president of Argentina.

"I didn't worry too much about my own safety," he says. "Nobody is interested in kidnaping a mere pianist. And an airplane is the safest place to be when earthquakes are happening." Sandor found the devastation in the Peruvian Andes so complete that "there was nothing to see from the air but an occasional church spire. All else was engulfed by floods and landslides."

DISASTER threatened the festival in Rio, where Sandor presented the three Bartok piano concertos. The conductor, Lucio Soto, resigned 26 hours before the program on

DEARBORN — Mystery, murder and mayhem take over the Henry Ford Museum stage as the Greenfield Village Players introduce the fourth play of the summer theater repertory, "Sherlock Holmes" Monday, Aug. 10, at 8:30 p.m.

Motherwell Displays Paper Art

The possibilities of paper as explored by abstract expressionist Robert Motherwell are displayed through Sunday, Aug. 30, on the South Wing Balcony of the Detroit Institute of Arts.

With collage, gouache, ink and charcoal, 31 of Motherwell's "Recent Works" become "Paper" play variations on several basic paper themes. For example, ordinary brown paper bags, mailing envelopes with foreign postmarks, Gauloise "bleu" cigarette packs, and the French label from a block of watercolor paper become components of collage in Motherwell's hands.

The exhibition comes to Detroit through Marborough Galleries in New York City, and all but four of the 31 works are for sale. Prices range from \$1,200 to \$4,250.

Motherwell's art reflects his close association and friendship with other greats of abstract expressionism: Jackson Pollock, Mark Rothko, Franz Kline and Barnett Newman among others. His many shows and exhibitions include a 1965 Retrospective at the Museum of Modern Art in New York.

Co-founder of the school "The Subject of the Artist" in New York City in 1948, Motherwell was art director of "Partisan Review" and taught at Hunter College in New York City. His wife is the American painter, Helen Frankenthaler.
