Report False Flyer

FARMINGTON The Farmington Jaycee Auxiliary is not sponsoring a baby-sitting clinic this year.

A hoax is being perpetuated by someone, possibly as a practical joke, who is circulating flyers announcing the clinic at Farmington Junior High School.

But the flyer was printed two years ago for a clinic held by the auxiliary at that time.

The flyer indicates a clinic will be held starting on Wednesday, Oct. 16, and running until Nov. 13. But Oct. 16 falls on a Friday this year.

A mother confused about the date called an auxiliary member who was chairman of the clinic two years ago. This was the first the auxiliary learned about the flyer being passed around.

The flyer is believed to have been circulated at Farmington Junior High and East Junior High and may have been at others.

"The auxiliary stresses it is not endorsing a baby-sitting clinic this year and asks that information on the two-year-old flyer be ignored."

Faculty Awaits State Report

FARMINGTON Contract negotiations are at a temporary standstill between Farmington teachers and the administration as both sides went into final hearings before a state fact-finder last week.

Four sessions have been held between administration officials and the Farmington Education Association with each side presenting its case to Michigan Labor Relations Commission fact-finder Roger Roumell, who is expected to return his report on negotiations "within a week," according to administration officials.

ROUMELL, an attorney, is "one of the veterans" of fact-finding in labor disputes, according to FEA Executive Director Roger Allen. Roumell was instrumental in bringing an end to a lengthy teacher strike in Birmingham a year ago.

Roumell's report will contain his recommendations on the

three key issues of the contract negotiations involving salary scales, fringe benefit program, and supplementary pay schedules.

ALLEN TOLD the Farmington Enterprise & Observer Thursday that both sides expected hearings to be completed by the end of last week, although Roumell had stated that he would have both parties back for another session on Monday if necessary.

Meetings were scheduled for Thursday and Friday evenings last week.

It acceptable to both sides, it will resolve the contract disagreement which has Farmington teachers currently working without a contract. Allen said he expected the report to be favorable to the teachers' position. "The cornerstone of the administration argument has been the cry of poverty," Allen said. "I think the hearings have already shown that the system has the ability to pay."

Adult lessons and recreational swimming will be held only at Farmington High School this year due to extra scheduling at North. Instruction will be from 7 to 7:50 p.m. on Wednesdays from Sept. 30 through Nov. 18. Recreation will follow from 8 to 8:50 p.m. with a fee of 50 cents per session.

Instructions for children will be available at both schools Saturdays from Oct. 3 through Nov. 21. Beginners will be scheduled from 9 to 9:50 a.m., beginners and advanced beginning from 10 to 10:50 a.m., beginners and intermediates 11 to 11:50 a.m.

Open swimming may be enjoyed at both pools Tuesdays and Thursdays beginning Sept. 29. First session will be from 8:30 to 7:40 p.m., second session 7:45 to 8:55 p.m. Student fee is 25 cents per period, adults 50 cents.

Swimmers must measure 38 inches from chin to floor. School district residents are given priority in registering for instruction.

Suits and towels are furnished by the swimmer, and anyone with long hair must wear a bathing cap.
