

### police/fire calls

Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police incidents, fire calls and court cases from the past week:

• **2 HURT**  
Two people were hurt when a dump truck struck a car, resulting in a collision that involved five vehicles at 12 Mile and Orchard Lake Road at the height of rush hour Oct. 7.

The truck turned onto its side, dumping part of its 10-ton load of asphalt onto the pavement and closing 12 Mile to eastbound traffic for

about one hour while the Oakland County Road Commission cleaned up the mess.

According to Sgt. Ray Cranston of the Farmington Hills Police Department Traffic Section:  
The dump truck was eastbound on 12 Mile at 4:30 p.m. when the brakes apparently failed as it entered the Orchard Lake Road intersection.

The truck struck a westbound car waiting to turn left. That car spun into another behind it while the truck struck two other cars in the left-turn

lane.

The truck driver and one of the other drivers were taken to Botsford General Hospital, Farmington Hills, for treatment. Farmington Hills firefighters assisted paramedics in treating the injured at the scene.

Police impounded the truck for inspection by the Michigan State Police Motor Carrier Division. Charges are pending.

• **WOMAN ROBBED**  
A 56-year-old Southfield woman was robbed of her purse containing \$200 while walking to her car outside Max & Erma's, 31205 Orchard Lake, Oct. 7.

According to a Farmington Hills police report:  
The woman was walking to her car at 8:30 p.m. when she was approached from behind by two men thought to be in their 20s.

They grabbed her purse but when she wouldn't let go, then pushed her against a car. When the strap broke, they took the purse and ran to a waiting car.

The woman suffered hand injuries during the struggle.

• **LARCENY BY TRICK**  
Little Caesars Pizza, 28726 Grand River, lost \$8 when a customer in his 20s asked for change, then handed the clerk several bills. He confused

her to the point where he left with an extra \$8, according to a Farmington Hills police report.

• **FELONY CHARGED**  
Three Wayne teenagers face felony charges in connection with the theft of a car from along Baywood and a radar detector from a car parked at Indian Creek Apartments Oct. 5-6.

Innocent pleas were entered in their behalf at their arraignment Oct. 6 before District Judge Michael Hand of Farmington. Each was charged with unlawfully driving away an automobile and breaking and entering of a vehicle. Bond was set at \$2,000, pending a preliminary exam in 47th District Court. They face up to five years in prison if convicted.

Following three hours of surveillance, Special Patrol Operational Team officers, assisted by Novi police, arrested three teenagers in a 1987 Chevrolet Camaro IROC at 1:45 a.m. Oct. 6 on Nine Mile near Haggerty. The three were in possession of a radar detector, detective David Loe of the Farmington Hills Police Department said.

• **BURGER BASH**  
A Farmington Hills man was ticketed for being drunk and disorderly and for assault Oct. 6 after a cashier

at Farmer Jack, 22128 Farmington, told officers a customer struck her with a package of hamburger meat.

According to a Farmington Department of Public Safety report:  
As a customer came through the checkout line, he became upset when the cashier asked for payment for the hamburger meat he was carrying. He grabbed the cashier around the neck and pushed the meat into her face.

When confronted by the store manager, the customer tore open the package and threw it on the floor.

• **THEFTS REPORTED**  
An in-dash radio valued at \$1,650 was reported stolen from a 1988 Grand Am parked at Bob Sellers Pontiac, 38000 Grand River, Oct. 2-7.

A tank full of gasoline was siphoned from a car parked at Chatham Hills Apartments Oct. 3-5.

In unfinished business, the council will consider a revised preliminary plan for Technology Hills, Bestak Construction Company, Hills Tech Drive, east of Haggerty Road.
