

## police/fire calls

Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police incidents, fire calls and court cases from the past week.

### PRELIMINARY EXAM SET

The preliminary examination for a Detroit man charged in the hit-and-run death of a 23-year-old Farmington Hills bicyclist is scheduled for Monday, Nov. 23.

Arrested Oct. 5 before District Judge Michael Hand of Farmington, Richard Lee Oliver, 22, pleaded

guilty to one count of involuntary manslaughter and one count of leaving the scene of a serious injury accident. The court took his pleas under advisement. Bond was set at \$5,000, pending a preliminary examination in 47th District Court.

Hand signed an arrest warrant against Oliver Sept. 30.

Edward Elden Marsh was pronounced dead at Botsford General Hospital, Farmington Hills, shortly after the 7:35 p.m. collision, on

Grand River near Colgate, Sept. 7.

He was crossing the southeast lanes of Grand River near Colgate at dusk when his bike was broadsided by a southeast-bound car that had come off of M-102. He was thrown into the windshield and carried about 200 feet before he fell to the ground, said Sgt. Ray Cranston of the Farmington Hills Police Department.

Marsh was not wearing a helmet nor was his bike illuminated. Police

believe the car was traveling faster than the posted 45 mph speed limit, Cranston said.

Farmington Hills district fire Chief Bob Rebovy followed the suspect car into Detroit. Detroit police stopped the car on a side street near Six Mile and Grand River. Oliver was identified from among the car's six occupants as the suspected hit-and-run driver, Cranston said.

### UNARMED ROBBERY

A security guard at a building under construction at 31440 Northwestern Highway was robbed of his wallet containing \$65 shortly after he completed a property check Nov. 4.

According to a Farmington Hills police report:

The guard had just completed a round at 11:45 p.m. when he was struck in the face by an unknown assailant. The blow caused him to drop his wallet. Two men ran from the area with the wallet.

The guard suffered bruises and swelling to the face.

### TRICK LARCENY

Ray's Mobil was tricked out of \$21 when a customer buying cigarettes Nov. 3 started exchanging money

with the cashier. The man left after exchanging four \$10 bills for \$19, according to a Farmington Department of Public Safety report.


