

police/fire calls

Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police incidents, fire calls and court cases reported during the past week:

TRUCK FIRE
A rear fire on a corrosives carrier carrying 5,000 gallons of sodium hypochlorite caught fire in the early morning July 22 while traveling north on I-275 at 10 Mile, according to a Farmington Hills fire report.
The fire began when the brake shoe malfunctioned and heated up the wheel. Despite the fire, which the driver began extinguishing with a dry chemical extinguisher, the non-flammable contents of the truck were not involved in the fire.
When firefighters arrived they finished extinguishing the fire with foam. Damage was estimated at \$300.

CHAIR FIRE
A discarded cigarette is listed as the cause of a chair fire in a house on Gilchrest, July 24, according to a Farmington Hills fire report.
When firefighters arrived at the

house they found the chair in the living room smoldering. The chair was removed and extinguished. Damage was estimated at \$250.

THEFTS REPORTED
Computer, communication and electronic office equipment valued at \$105,000 was reported stolen from an unoccupied building at 31666 Eight Mile, between March 31 and July 24.


WANDA A. DULLACK
