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## 250 BAPTISTS IN FARMINGTON FOR ANNUAL MEETING

Program Includes Sessions In Both Morning And Afternoon At Church

Approximately 250 delegates of the Detroit Baptist Association were gathered in Farmington Thursday morning for the one hundred and first annual meeting of the Detroit Baptist Association, the Farmington Baptist church being the scene of the meeting. Farmington Baptist Church is the oldest in the association.

An interesting program, including many annual features of the association meetings, was started at 10:00 o'clock in the morning. The annual sermon was delivered by Rev. Frank Kaiser during the morning session.

At the afternoon session, a symposium on evangelism was the feature, with divisions into pastoral, personal and church evangelism. The women's session was a part of the afternoon program.

An address, "Missing the Main Chance," by Rev. Fred McAllister, of Royal Oak, was on the evening program. Rev. William Colman is moderator of the association, and Rev. Elmer Palmer, of Farmington Baptist Church, is clerk.

## WOMAN IS KILLED ON GRAND RIVER ROAD NEAR NOVI

Brighton Man Escapes Injury When Cars Collide On Wet Pavement

Grand River avenue near Novi was the scene of a fatal accident early Monday morning when an automobile skidded on the wet pavement and crashed against a guard-rail, crushing to death Mrs. May Hammond, of Elmira, N. Y. The machine, driven by Mrs. Hammond's son, Leslie, swayed down the road for a considerable distance, during the skid, following application of the brakes, and collided with another car.

The accident victim, with her son, and a friend, Mrs. Richard Fox, of Elmira, were on their way home from a visit in Greenwell. When near Novi, a car driven by Emory Stedman, of Brighton, approached, and Hammond applied his brakes. The car, skid into a guard rail, then careened off and struck Stedman's car, but Stedman escaped injury, as did Mrs. Fox and Hammond.

It was found, however, that Mrs. Hammond had been severely crushed at the impact, and probably died instantly. The body was taken to Pontiac by Coroner O. C. Farmer.

On Friday, September 23, the Farmington High School football team, with only about a week's practice, went to Berkeley for a football game and was beaten, 18 to 0.

The Farmington boys were outclassed and their lack of sufficient practice was shown in many fumbles and misplays.

Last Friday, they met the big Belleville team and again were defeated, this time 13 to 0. However, considering that the team representing Belleville had last year beaten the local team 54 to 0, this year's score does not seem bad in comparison. Belleville, although outweighing our boys considerably, was held to 0 to 0 the first half. But soon after the kick-off took the ball over half the way down the field and scored on a series of line bucks. Middlewood blocked the try for point.

Later, on a sweeping end run a Belleville halfback brought the ball down the field and Belleville scored again. This time they passed over the goal for the point.

A rather unportsmanlike act committed by a Belleville man was roundly "booed." Having been tackled by Otis, he became angry and slugged Farmington's fullback. The referee saw it, however, and ordered him off the field and penalized Belleville 25 yards.

Request For Car Service Brings Promise Of Survey By Manager

Road Work Proceeding Rapidly

The action of the Farmington Exchange Club toward bringing trolley express service of the Detroit Department of Street Railways to Farmington has resulted in an announcement that Del A. Smith, manager of the Detroit system, will visit Farmington soon and look over the situation. The announcement was made at the Exchange Club meeting Wednesday noon by Howard Warner.

Mr. Warner was appointed last week by President Carl Hogle to investigate the possibilities of obtaining a renewal of car service from Farmington to Detroit. Mr. Smith is out of the city at present, but is expected to return soon and come to Farmington in the near future.

Meanwhile, the State is rushing with all possible speed the Grand River widening program. A large number of men with teams and tractors are at work on the grading. Work is in progress on both sides of the trolley tracks, west of Hemlock Stop. The widening is to be carried out 3,000 feet west of this point, and apparently the State plans to utilize land on both sides of the car tracks for the wider road project.

Concrete This Fall

It is expected that the grading will be completed within a short time, and that the concrete will be laid in time for use through the winter. No information has been forthcoming as to whether the widening program will be taken up next spring at the point to which it has been carried thus far.

One strip of the new pavement east of Hemlock Stop, on the north side of the trolley tracks, is laid with concrete, and the remaining 20-foot strip is ready for paving.
