### EDITORIAL

#### PETTY POLITICAL GRABBERS DEVOID OF DECENCY

The intimation by a Lansing newspaper correspondent that members of the Michigan Supreme Court are on a level with a large number of petty politicians and salary grabbers who unfortunately seem to be in the majority in both houses of the legislature, is a fine piece of news to spread throughout the state where already a growing distrust of office holders exists.

The correspondent states that a member of the legislature expressed the opinion that the act just passed allowing members of the house and senate \$5.00 a day or expenses would ride smoothly through the supreme court, where it is sure to be tested, as a bill raising the salaries of the judges was being held up for the present. The intimation being that the price of a favorable report on the bill by the committee was a decision declaring the extra pay for legislators legal.

If any such intimation was made by a legislator, Michigan may well hang its head in shame. At best the state has no reason for feeling proud of the personnel of its law making body, but the fact that there are members of it who entertain the idea that the judges of the supreme court are on the same low moral level as themselves, is simply disgusting.

There is no reason for believing that the supreme court can be bought. No such thought exists in the minds of the people, with the exception of the petty political grabbers who are total strangers to all decency.
