FARMINGTON BOY DESCRIBES LIFE IN THE U. S. NAVY

Irving Lancaster Writes of Experiences in Great Lakes Training School

A letter that answers questions as to the manner of life in the U. S. Navy has been received in Farmington by a resident of Farmington, Mrs. Lyman Farrand, of Valley View avenue, from her son, Irving Lancaster. The writer has been for some time in the U. S. Naval Training School at Great Lakes, Ill., and in response to many queries from her friends, Mrs. Farrand has permitted the Enterprise to publish portions of the letter:

Uncle Sam feeds his sailors on roast chicken, with ice cream for dessert, on Sunday, and his young sailors think it's "not so bad," to use Lancaster's words. The letter follows in part:

U. S. N. T. S.
Great Lakes, Ill.
August 20, 1927.

Dear Mother and All:

I have a surprise for you—I will be home on the ninth or tenth of September, that is if everything works out as we want it to. I have been in the main camp just one week today. If Everard is out of work, tell him to "Join the Navy." We have a new commander here—the old fellow threw a sword at one of the boys and Lieut. Keating saw him—he is up for trial now. The new commander is a real fellow. It seems funny for me to get only one dollar in a month. There is a company going out every week, and we are to go in two and a half weeks. I must drill four hours a day now but before it was eight hours, when I was in "detention."

They surely put up good meals here—we are going to have chicken dinner tomorrow and ice cream—not so bad.

You should see our hammocks. They are eight-feet off the floor—one of the boys fell out of his and broke two ribs.

Four fellows out of our company deserted, and three of them were caught—three of them are in jail. One of them was the fellow the commander stabbed.

I am sending you a bulletin of the "Great Lakes."
