Deadline Extended For DSA

FARMINGTON The deadline has been extended until 5 p.m. May 14 for persons to make nominations for the distinguished service award (DSA) given each year by the Farmington Area Jaycees to the community's outstanding young man.

The deadline has been extended until Friday, May 14, because of a change in the age limit determining eligibility for the DSA nominees.

Dave Hammond, project chairman for the Jaycees, says the new age limit is any man between the ages of 21-36 who will not be 37 before Jan. 31, 1971.

The nominee must either work or live in the Farmington area and persons nominating must detail what contributions their choice has made on the community, state or national level.
