What Sturdy remembers most is that Moore, who coached for four or five years, enjoyed working with youngsters as well as their parents. And he had a talent for coaching the 9- to 13-year-olds.

"We were real happy to have him with us," Sturdy said.

He remembered how committed Moore was to the Vikings. The football program alone was about 14 weeks long, with practices almost every day, Sturdy said. Moore was always there. And he was back again

for baseball practice, coaching and games in the spring.

"It's difficult for a young man of 21 to spend the time he did with us. A boy with that commitment... He did it because there was a need for his help. He did it because he liked it," Sturdy said.

But he also never missed a game played by Ryan, who followed his big brother's footsteps as a football player for North Farmington. "And he always attended film nights after the games," Lee said. "He loved football."

The 1988 North Farmington graduate had not long ago started his own window washing business with a friend, Lee said.

In his memory, the Vikings organization and the North Farmington-West Bloomfield baseball league are accepting donations for the Gary Moore Scholarship Fund. The goal is to provide two scholarships annually for kids interested in football and baseball. For more information, call Heath at 737-4118.

Keep residency rules, says safety chief

Officers Association of Michigan. "We're in a quandary when we're limited to six miles. It's pretty much a concern with housing prices too. Farmington is becoming rather exclusive."

Commander Michael Wiggins, head of the Farmington Command Officers' Association of Michigan bargaining unit, said, "Anything that would increase our freedom as employees, we would favor. I think it's something that people want."

Traditionally, residency requirements are brought to the collective bargaining table. The issue has been raised at the legislative level in previous years, but had never

moved as far through the system as it has this year.

Lauboff says he does not consider it an issue of labor versus management, but of cities versus the state. "We don't feel we need to confine people to the city of Farmington. We don't want to be unreasonable," he added. "We have learned to adapt and learned to manage."

The residency issue has arisen at the local bargaining table several times with officers, and once with commanders, Majigan and Wiggins said. There has never been a change in policy.

WIGGINS SAID about half of Farmington's public safety department lives in the Farmington area. All four of the city's shift command-

ers live in Farmington or Farmington Hills.

"You have to ask whether it (such a law) would make any difference," Wiggins added. "Obviously there's some benefit of living close to work. Personally, I don't want to drive an hour and a half to work, but some people do."

State Rep. Jan Dolan, R-Farmington Hills, said she would vote against the bill if it comes before the full house. "I'm one of those very strong for local control," said the former Farmington Hills councilwoman. "The state has no business putting their nose in that area."

State Sen. Jack Faxon, D-Farmington Hills, voted against the legislation in 1991.

"This has been a very controver-

DOING BETTER BUT FEELING WORSE

The surgeon declares your hand, hip, or knee surgery a success, but you don't feel right. Since the operation, you have been tired, irritable, and downcast. Does your lack of progress mean you need more surgery? Or are you experiencing post-operative depression. This is a pain to post-traumatic reaction, or what follows in the recovery from stroke or a coronary bypass operation.
