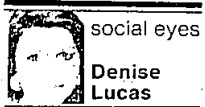


Gala to feature fashion, art, auction, music

EDUCATION '92 (A DREAM PARTY TO END A NIGHTMARE)
More than 1,000 movers and shakers will be at Industry nightclub in Pontiac on Tuesday when a multidimensional gala will take place, like never before - mixing fashion, art, an international auction, music and dancing.

Magic Johnson and Mary Fisher have opened our eyes to the reality of AIDS. Education '92 plans to raise \$100,000 to benefit DIFA, a national foundation that responds to all crises faced by AIDS victims. Organized by a group of nationally renowned artists, DIFA has funded more than \$2.5 million to community agencies.
