Agency to distribute free food

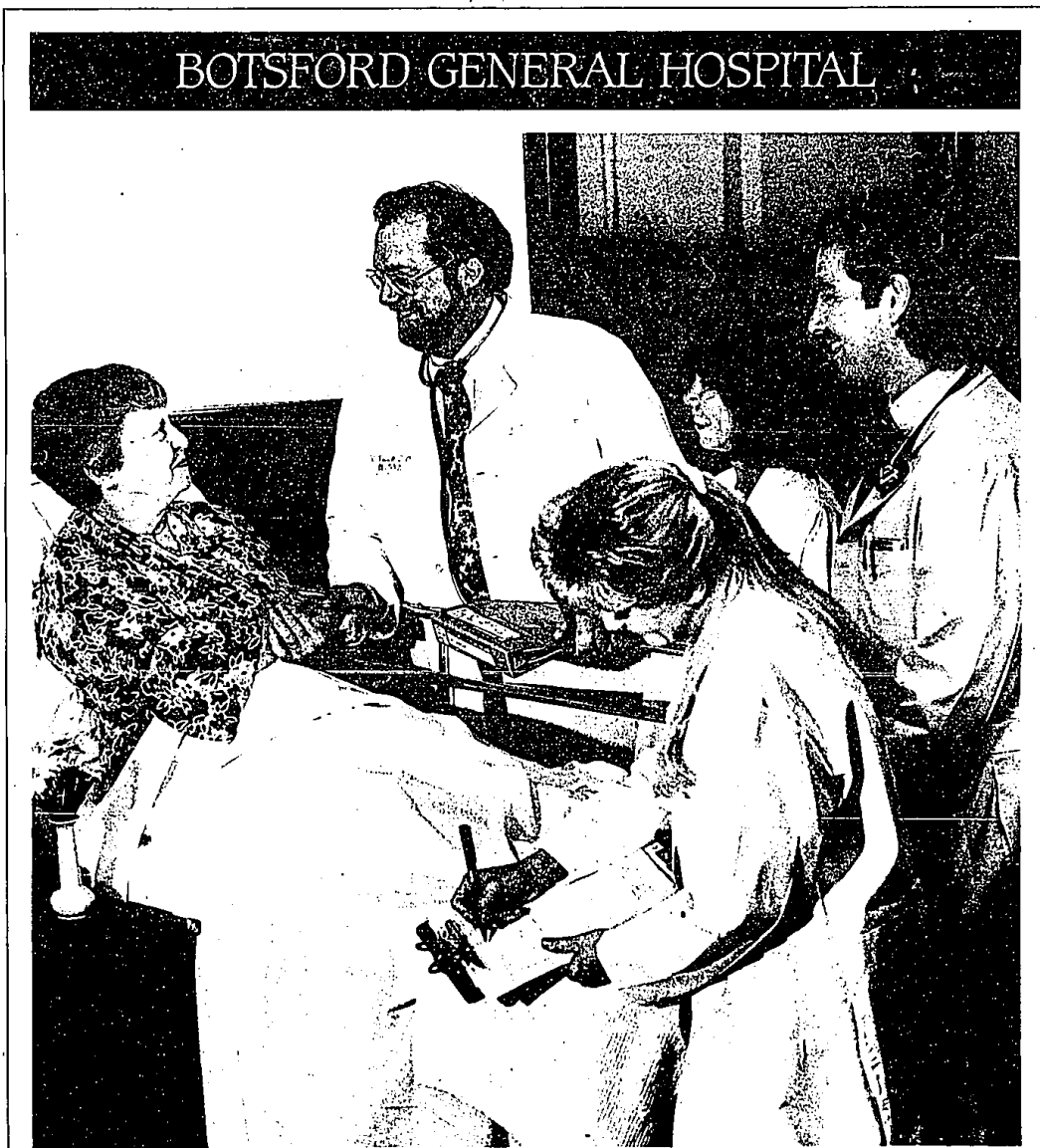
