Carnicolas was first in the 200 freestyle (1:58.29) and the 500 freestyle (6:17.05), and Julie Gallagher won the backstroke (1:02.78). The Spartans also had three more state cuts from Gina Palmeri, Gallagher and Jamie Hilliard at the backstroke.

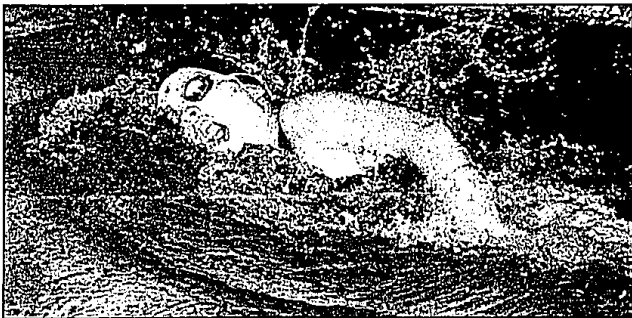
Falk, Kelly Carlisle, Lisa Morrison, Carnicolas and Aristeo were on two relay teams each. Gallagher and Helene Dallas were the other relay swimmers.

Gallagher, Falk, Carlisle and Morrison finished the medley relay in 1:59.58 and broke the mark (1:52.77) established by the Spartans in 1984.

"The most impressive record was the medley record," Phill said. "We weren't fonder, I pulled Anna off, and they beat our good kids. The kids who set the record were all superstars."

"The Spartans have been pointing toward the Class A championships from the start of the season and appear ready for that challenge."

"None of my state kids were shaved or rested," Phill said. "I think we're going to go up there and have a great state meet and let the points fall where they may. If we win it, we do. If we swim great, that's all you can ask."

Simply the best

Plymouth Salem coach Chuck Olson believes the '93 Spartans are the best the WLAA has produced and will be rooting for them to win the state title.

"I think we could have an all-WLAA team (combining all the Stevensons) and they would be way short," he said. "We could put the best against them and they're still better."

"They proved it at the league meet. They have to prove it at the state meet now. They had some

good state meets but never won it."

The only non-Stevensons winners were North Farmington senior Mandi Terrell, who shattered the WLAA diving record, and Plymouth Canton senior Jill Mellis in the butterfly (1:00.85).

Terrell, who won her second straight diving title, scored 465.60 points to break the record of 427.55 by Salem's Cindy McMurray in 1982. Terrell won with 424.65 points last year.

"She has been real dedicated to the sport," North swim coach Pat Duthie said. "She had some shyness and developed it well. A lot of college coaches are interested in her, and I think she's going to be an outstanding collegiate diver."

Canton coach Hooker Wellman blamed himself for not resting his swimmers more after the Chiefs finished third. Canton beat

Northville in a dual meet at Northville, but the Mustangs used their superior depth to their advantage in the league meet.

"It's funny how things work out," he said. "We got caught in their (five-lane) pool a number of times when we had better depth. This year we have the strength up front. If we swim (the dual) in our pool, they probably would have beaten us on depth."

Livonia Churchill swimmers had a 100-percent drop in their times Friday. Of the 26 swimmers, they were faster. The Chargers dropped a total of 35 seconds, according to coach Ken Stark. Churchill's Mary Corazza and Kim Gruska also qualified for state with second-place swims in the 500 and 600 freestyles, respectively.

CITY OF FARMINGTON SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE C-605-93 THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS: Section 9, Subscriber Service Rates, of Article III, of Appendix A, Franchises, of the City Code of the City of Farmington, is hereby amended as follows: Requires the grantee to establish initial rates for service in accordance with Federal Communications Rates. Adopts by reference the Federal Communications Rules governing Cable Rate Regulation. Requires cable operator to submit all documentation regarding any requests to increase service rates to the Clerk. Adopts by reference procedures set forth in 47 CFR 0.459 regarding conditional service rate increases, to comply with rate regulations subjecting cable operator to monetary forfeiture.
