LINCOLN CLUB SETS UNIQUE RECORD FOR BANQUET

Four Different Denominations Will Be Represented

DR. GUNSAULUS SPEAKS MONDAY WITH PRESIDENT TAFT

Comes to Pontiac Direct from New York City—Smoking Will Be Eliminated this Year

With every place on the program with the exception of one filled by divines of different denominations, the directors of the Lincoln Republican club have set a novel record for the annual banquet which is to be held in the Pontiac opera house Wednesday evening Feb. 15. Rev. C. A. Lippincott, Presbyterian, Flint, is toastmaster; Rev. H. F. Fox, Episcopalian, of Pontiac, J. chaplain; Rev. Geo. W. Jenning, Methodist, of Mt. Clemons, will respond to one of the evening's toasts; and Rev. Frank W. Gunsaulus, Congregationalist, of Chicago, will deliver the principal address of the evening. The other toast will be responded to by Attorney General Franz Kubo.

The tickets for the function have been printed, but will not be ready for distribution until Monday. The catering will be done by the ladies of the Congregational church. In accordance with the request of Dr. Gunsaulus and Harold Jarvis, the directors will ask that there be no smoking during the banquet.

The toasts of some of the speakers have so far been secured. Dr. Gunsaulus is at present absent from Chicago and will come from Pontiac on February 15 direct from New York city. While in Gotham he will be one of the speakers at the republican gathering which is to be held Feb. 13 and at which Roosevelt Taft and ex-President Roosevelt will speak.
