

POLICE/FIRE CALLS

Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police incidents, fire calls and court cases reported during the past week.

BREAK-INS
A pair of women's Rollerblades worth \$500 were stolen from a gold 1991 Ford Aerostar after the driver's window was broken March 18-19 causing \$250 in damage.

THEFTS

HEART ATTACK

Farmington Hills firefighters from Station 4 responded to a call from a residence on Hunters Point on a reported heart attack at 8:01 a.m. March 20. The victim, a 57-year-old man, had been shoveling snow before coming into his house. He was discovered in the bathroom, after collapsing. Firefighters attempted CPR, three shocks and other means to revive the man. He was taken to Botsford General Hospital in Farmington Hills where he was pronounced dead at 8:39 a.m.

ASSAULTS

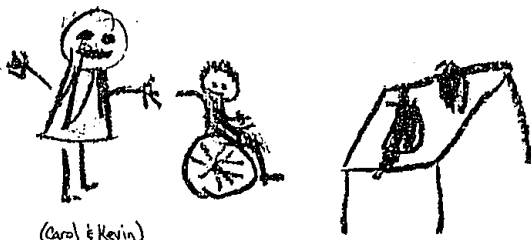
FIRE
