tion" for the city and was a good planner, but lacked broader management skills.

He said Call was an experienced administrator who had a strong engineering and development background, but might not be a good match in terms of leadership and networking.

Several council members said they felt awkward about discussing the three who they believe are top people they don't want to lose. Councilman Terry Sever had been willing to go further.

"I have seen these people hired and moved into management," he said. "I may, in the end, opt to consider Dave Call as one of the finalists."

Bennett said that was the council's prerogative, but that he had chosen the best candidates.

As of press time, Bennett said

that he had not been able to contact three of the six candidates the council wanted to interview to confirm that they still wanted to be considered. At least three of the candidates will pursue the job. None of them are women. The three candidates are:

James D. Prosser, the city manager of Richfield, Minn., is one of those the council is considering. He has been Richfield's city manager for 12 years and had worked in Illinois before that.

Prosser has a strong background in land use. Minneapolis Airport and the M of America are in Richfield. The community is upper middle income, ethnically and racially diverse and is involved in redevelopment.

Mark Wallenweber, the city manager of St. Clair Shores, is also being considered. He knows

southeast Michigan and had been the city manager of Huntington Woods. He is interested in human issues, has dealt with similar issues as those in Farmington Hills, including an ice arena, and wants to manage a larger city.

Steven R. Sarkozy, the city manager of Roseville, Minn., another Minneapolis suburb, has Michigan connections. He was an assistant city manager in Beverly Hills and in the Grand Rapids suburb of Wyoming before heading to Geneva, N.Y. and then to Minnesota.

Roseville, Minn., is similar to Farmington Hills in terms of its mix of residential, commercial and industrial base. It is a high service demand and fiscally conservative managed city, Bennett said.

After school fight leads to hospital for East student

Farmington Hills police are investigating a fight between two teenagers near East Middle School that put one of the teens in the hospital.

According to police reports, two students were riding a bike north of the school. Another boy grabbed the a 13-year-old, who was on the back of the bike at about 2:30 p.m. April 28. The other boy intervened on his friend's behalf and a fight started.

Witness accounts vary, but police and East school officials

believe that both boys threw punches. The injured boy was struck in the eye.

He was taken to Botsford General Hospital after complaining of stomach and chest pains. He had a lacerated intestine and was operated on Saturday. A cut over his eye required six stitches. He was in good condition Tuesday.

"We're not sure who really started the fight," said East Principal Eugene Seaborn. "It appears that both of them were throwing punches."

Farmington Hills school liaison

Officer Pat Sledge is investigating the case. Seaborn said the school suspends students for fighting.

"The one boy is in the hospital," he said. "The other student will be back Thursday (today)."

"There are no charges yet," said Hills Lt. Chuck Nobua. "We're interviewing several witnesses."

Seaborn said the school is impressing upon students the dangers of fighting in the wake of the incident.

her the man she spoke to previously had a heart attack and her paperwork was lost.

He added that she was now entitled \$51,208, but would have to send another \$2,274 upfront to receive it. She did but hasn't heard anything since.

The woman's daughter alerted Farmington police, who plan to contact law enforcement agencies to find out if there are similar complaints. A phone number left by both telemarketers turned out to be a voice mail message.

"It's probably a message that is not going to be returned," Wiggins said.

When the woman donated money before, police speculate her name ended up on a list. Such lists are often sold, Wiggins said.
