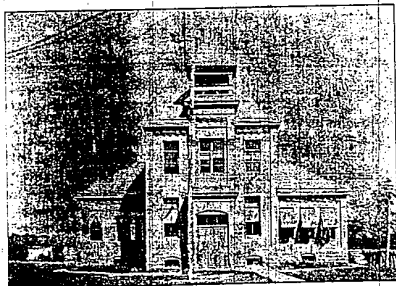
On Sunday evening, the 18th, Rev. George Davey of Redford will preach the baccalaureate sermon in the Methodist church.
