Sue Karczewski, clerk at the Farmington Shoe Repair, lives near the market and shops there regularly. "It's an unfortunate incident," she said, "but I've shopped there all along and I'll continue to do so." Shoe repair customer Janine Barr of West Bloomfield agreed. "It could have happened anywhere," she said. At the Korner Barbers, Grand River and Farmington Road, barber Noelen Lamb was no stranger to Cattlemen's during the October outbreak. "I had lunch down there just about every day at their deli," she said, "and I'm fine." Neither Legionnaires' disease nor its mysterious source was much a worry for Gail McAuley, barmaid at Cowley's, a popular watering hole on Grand River. "I live right here in town and I went about my chores as usual. I thought it (the outbreak) was over." Added Cowley's customer Ron McKenzie of Southfield, "I'm surprised it was just one place. Cooling towers are all over." Further along the bar, Scott Taggart said he hoped people would listen to what Cattlemen's people had to say. "Hear both sides" is the way he put it. "That kind of thing can kill you," he said. "I'm in business

Sonya Mitrikeska, behind the counter at the Farmington Bakery, said she'll continue to shop at Cattlemen's. "I think it's not fair to that business," she said. "They're not really responsible. Anyone could get that in their air conditioner." Most downtown business people were relieved that the source of a deadly disease had finally been found. "I'm glad they found out," said Jenny Mihajlovski at the Baskin-Robbins ice cream store on Farmington Road. "I lost a lot of business for three weeks."

The two men were able to get to a dark blue 1990 or 1991 Ford Taurus and drive away on west-bound Grand River with the woman's purse.
