## ROAD TO BE READY SOON

### WORK PROGRESSING RAPIDLY ON GRAND RIVER

Road Commissioners to Direct Expenditure of Redford's Surplus Road Money

Work along Grand River avenue is progressing at a more rapid rate since the large crew was brought over from Gratiot avenue. This road will certainly be one in which the people can take a just pride when it is finished for it will be just like a smooth pavement.

The Grand River road taps a large territory of as fine farming country as there is in the world and when the work is completed there will be an endless procession of vehicles traversing it all the time.

In conversation with Supervisor Burt of Redford, we learn that the road will likely be opened for traffic clear through to Detroit in a very short time.

Although the board of supervisors found that they could not take over the balance of the fund in the hands of the township of Redford for road building, the road commissioners will do the work and supervise the expenditure so that the effect will be the same.

That portion of the cement road built by the township from the village of Redford to the eastern limits of the township will be widened and a top surface put over the old road.

Work will be started on the Plymouth road in a week or two.
