VOTE AGAIN ON WATER WORKS

SLIGHT TECHNICAL ERROR MAKES IT NECESSARY

Will Make no Particular Difference as Work Was to be Postponed Until Spring

Owing to an error in the official resolution the water works election will have to be held again as the bond buyers find a technical flaw in the proceedings that would make the bond invalid.

It will make no perceptible difference in the work as the council had concluded to wait until spring to complete the building and lay the mains.

The call for another election is published in the Enterprise this week and we shall have to go through the form of another election, but there will be no anxiety this time as public sentiment was fully expressed at the previous election.

PRIMARY SCHOOL FUND

The November Apportionment is at the Rate of Only 50c per Capita

The November apportionment of the primary school interest fund is very low this year, only 50c per capita. The total amount for Oakland county is only \$5,091. Farmington township with 462 children of school age draws \$231 which will be apportioned among the several districts.

This will likely cut quite a figure with many districts, as they have been receiving from \$5 to \$7 per capita for same years past and have usually taken that amount into consideration when voting their annual budget.

Another Local Option Campaign

A final meeting is to be held at Pontiac next Tuesday, at which time it is expected that another campaign for local option will be decided upon. The promoters propose to start petitions at once in order to get them before the board of supervisors at the January meeting. In that case the election would be held next spring.
