## A SUCCESSFUL BASE BALL SEASON

Farmington Closed by Winning From the Loyal Guards, a Fast Team of Detroit

The Farmington base ball team closed a most successful season Saturday by cleaning up a bunch of very fast ball players from Detroit, called the Loyal Guards, by a 6 to 4 score.

The game was about as exciting an exhibition as has been staged on the local grounds this year. The visiting team were about as clever an aggregation as the locals have stacked up against in some time, especially in the field and on the sacks, but they were helpless at the bat against Johnson, who pitched the most brilliant game he has uncorked this season. With any kind of support by his inner-works he would have scored a shut out, but considering the miserable work of the infield, who seemed to have an off day, he was lucky to get away with game and only masterful swirling in the pinches saved the day.

The Loyal Guards scored in the second on errors but it was the fourth before our boys tasted blood. Paterson opened the fourth with a double over the center fielder's head, Pierce dumped one to left center and stole second, while Paterson was held on third, Harley Warner scored them both with a poke over the right field fence.

The Detroiters knotted the count in the next inning, once more through errors by Johnson's supporting caste. Our boys came back in their half of the same inning and Carey Coe scored a run from third when Paterson's hot shot was juggled by the Guards' shortstop.

The Detroit bunch were again handed a run in the first of the eighth, when Big Anne heaved the ball to left, trying to pick a runner off third.

At this stage of the contest the home talent thought it was about time to put the game on ice and forthwith proceeded to do it. With the score tied at 3 all Carey Coe opened the eighth with a single, Paterson walked, Pierce slammed the first ball pitched to right center for two sacks and Coe scored what proved to be the winning tally. Just for good measure Maas poled the pill to center and Paterson and Pierce clattered over the dish. Detroit scored one in the ninth and had a man on third when Pierce grabbed a high fly to left for the third out.

Harley Warner was back at shortstop for the first time since he dislocated his ankle, and although his throwing was not up to his standard, his hitting was hard and timely, being directly responsible for two runs.

Wilmer Johnson pitched great ball in the face of discouraging support and deserves full credit for the game.

### New Registration not Necessary

Attorney General Roger I. Wykes in a letter to County Clerk Babcock of Oakland county, states that it will not be necessary to receive a new registration in this or any other county of the state this fall. Mr. Babcock wrote to him for instructions. The attorney general states that it will only be necessary for those who are not already registered to register on the second Saturday preceding the general election which falls on October 26.

Many people, he declared, confuse the registration and enrollment. A person may have enrolled for a primary and still not be registered and unless he registers by October 26 will not have the opportunity of voting. The enrollment is only for the primary election and has nothing to do with the registration for a general election.
