## MILK GOES UP 1¢

Shortage of Feed Given as the Cause for the Advance

The price of milk has advanced, a slight increase to the producer and one cent a quart to the city consumer. The reason given is the shortage of feed. Nine cents a quart it now costs the good people of Detroit which is one cent higher than it was when at the highest point last year. That's a big price to pay for milk and the worst feature of the deal is that the rich milk dealers in the city get far more than their share in the increase. Only a fraction of the one cent advance goes to the farmer.

### A New and Larger Garage

Carl Ely has begun the erection of a new building to be occupied by his automobile business. The structure will occupy the site of the present wooden building which will be torn down. The new garage is to be of cement block construction and with a frontage of 70 feet. It will be one of the largest and most complete garages in the state outside of Detroit and when completed will be equipped with modern machinery and appliances to do everything necessary in the work of repairing automobiles as well as other machinists work.

Mr. Ely has already worked up a fine and lucrative business and feels that the past warrants the building of larger and better quarters and a general expansion for the benefit of the trade.

### Kelley's Car Jumped the Tracks

The second car down Monday morning met with a mishap at the corner of Grand River and Griswold streets, which shook up the passengers somewhat and considerably bruised and battered several men who were riding on the back platform.

The rear trucks of the car left the tracks and let the car crash into a Fourteenth street car.

Among those injured were conductor Mike Kelly, who suffered bad bruises in several places, the worst one being on his arm which, at first, was thought to be broken.

E. J. Knowles and a young man named Wm. Evans were Redford passengers who were injured, Knowles only slightly, but Evans had his nose broken in addition to other injuries. A Greenfield man named Robert Place was taken to St. Mary's hospital with a badly injured back and severe bruises about the head and body.

The car was in charge of the veteran, Conductor Kelly and "Billy" Millard.

### New Buildings in Farmington

A fine, large, new house is being built on the corner north of the town hall by Joseph Voight. This is a very desirable location and the building of this house will add very much to the attractiveness of Division street.

The James L. Hogle house on west Grand River avenue is also progressing and will also be a valuable addition to this already well-built section of the village.

These two new residences together with the new water works building and the new Park Garage, now under construction, show a healthy, if not rapid, growth of the town. These structures do not really tell the whole story, for the needs of the village are in advance of the buildings. Several houses could be quickly and easily rented, if they were to be had this fall.

The future of Farmington was never brighter than it is at the present time. The completion of the new cement road to Detroit is a factor that will help this village in the same ratio that it is already helping to build up the farming district tributary to the road.
