MEMBERS OF SCOUT TROOP ARE HONORED AT CLARENCEVILLE

Troop At Children's Hospital One Of Five In United States

Troop 46, Boy Scouts of America, one of the five troops for crippled children in the United States, held a court of awards at the Children's hospital on Tuck road at Grand River last week.


Three achievement badges were given to Donald Pullner, Eugene Foster and Paul Mazur. Each of these boys also received a personal letter from James West, head of the Boy Scouts of America, who himself was a cripple until 31 years old. In the history of scouting only 531 of these badges have been received among the mil-

lions of boys who are active in the organization.

Those who attended the court of awards were Herbert Watson, Scout executive, and Mr. Keezy, Scout commissioner, of Pontiac, Clarence Witte, commissioner for the southern district, Clarence Barber and M. H. Witte, scoutmaster, who is an Eagle scout and also a sea scout of Ship 408, Redford, Lawrence Kerr, skipper, and Lloyd Carrier, first mate, of Redford, and a number of the crew of Ship 408.

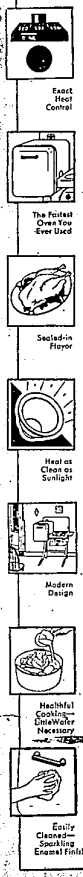

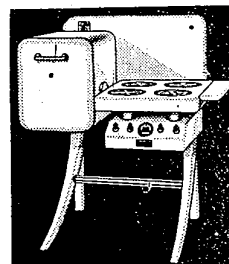
