The Civic Welfare Club will meet for a pot luck dinner and Mrs. William Hoyt.

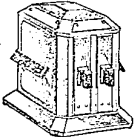
The club will sponsor another benefit card party which will be held at the home of Mrs. Frank Nook on Monday December 5. Bridge and five hundred will be played.

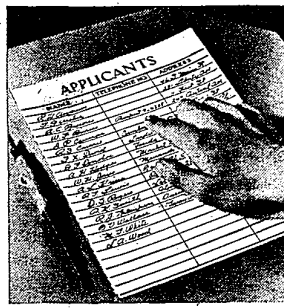
