City Collection

For the City, Lewis C. Thayer, reports collection of \$5,142.49 out of the total roll of \$40,411.14, or about 12 1/2 per cent. A year ago there was received by the end of the tax-collecting period \$24,793 out of the total bill of \$68,058.38 or 35 percent. With more than a month to go, the City will reach last year's percentage if \$9,000 is paid in.

Mr. Thayer reported a considerable number of taxpayers in the City paying up their school taxes only. Mrs. Cox reported one outstanding instance, in which one owner of 42 lots sent in a check for the school taxes only, and the lots happened to be in Farmington School District, No. 5.

MRS. C. B. PARKER FUNERAL SERVICES WILL BE FRIDAY

Pneumonia Takes Oakland Road Resident After Illness of Few Days

Funeral services for Mrs. Carl Parker, age 56, who died Tuesday at the Harper Hospital in Detroit, will be conducted at the residence, 3519 Oakland Road, at 2 p. m. Friday. The Rev. F. C. Johnson of the Methodist Church will be in charge.

Mrs. Parker was taken to the Harper Hospital at Bay City, but was later reported better. She died of pneumonia at 7 p. m. Tuesday. The body was taken to the Spencer Heehey funeral home, from where it will be removed to the home Friday morning.

Mrs. Parker, whose maiden name was Effa Mae Fisher, was born in New Hudson March 1, 1876. After graduating from Normal School at Pontiac, she taught in the schools in and around New Hudson for ten years. She married C. B. Parker in 1901, moving here in 1916.

Mrs. Parker had been active in the M. E. Church and the Ladies' Aid for the past 15 years. She was a past officer of Farmington Woman's Club and had been active in all civic and cultural projects of the woman's club. Her last public appearance was on Wednesday on account of the death of Mrs. Parker. The club will attend the services at the residence in a body.

The deceased is survived by the husband, C. B. Parker, one son, Gerald Parker of Detroit, and a sister, Mrs. G. W. Hills and one brother, John Fisher, both of Northville.
