City To Present New Work Plan To State Heads

Detailed Plans Drawn For Participation In Recovery Program

Important developments in the campaign to put persons on the welfare back to work have occurred during the past week in the Farmington area.

If the plans are approved, the government will pay 30 percent of the cost and the remainder can be borrowed from the R. F. C.

Because of the reduction in the number of persons on the township welfare rolls and the fact that all groceries are now bought on a cash basis and delivered direct to the welfare office, Clyde Seelye, assistant in the welfare office, has voluntarily offered to cut his work to two days per week whenever his services are required.

All welfare activities in Oakland county will be consolidated under a county emergency welfare relief commission and a director of welfare, according to plans being formulated at Lansing and at Pontiac.

Under the new plan, the county will be divided into five districts. An assistant director will be in charge of each district. Funds will be supplied equally by the Federal government, the state government, and the local units.
