Team Prospects Not Encouraging

Inexperience And Lack Of Weight May Count Heavily Against Gridder's Chances

Prospects are not bright for a highly successful football team this year at Farmington High School. H. P. Kammerer, head coach, decided after taking his first look at this year's candidates this week. Inexperience and light material are held as the two major reasons.

Wendell Rose and Chuck Lee appear to be good prospects for the tackle positions while the flanks should be well fortified with such candidates as Carl Smith, Bill Mitchell and Frank Hamilton, according to Kammerer.

Tony Himmelspach, Norman Barrows, Jr., and Harry Hamilton are experienced linemen available for backfield posts. They can all pass and kick better than the average and it is hoped they will work into a good scoring combination.

Early indications are that Jack Glassford and Doug Parker will share the center duties. Neither has had much experience but both show promise. The quarterback position will probably be hard to fill and may be the team's most glaring weakness, the coach feels.

Kammerer said that he considers every position open on the team and is hopeful that some good material will be uncovered from the wealth of new boys reporting this year.

File Campaign Expense Accounts In Home County

All campaign expense accounts, under the law, are filed with county clerks. Candidates file their personal accounts with the clerks in the counties in which they reside. County campaign committees for candidates seeking state or national offices file in their own counties while state campaign committees file their accounts in the home county of the candidate. The law requires that all expense accounts be filed within 10 days after a primary election.

Enrollment in New High School

Most Grades in Schools Show Increase

The largest enrollment in the history of Farmington schools greeted Supt. John J. Leonard and his staff of teachers Monday morning at the Farmington school. The total enrollment for 1934-35 in the grades and in the high school, shading the previous high mark set last year, was 228 enrolled in the grades and 224 in the high school for a total of 452.

There are 18 more enrolled in Farmington high school than last year and 48 more in the grades. Increases in enrollment were even noted in the primary pupils, 125 as compared with the high school this year, compared to last year's mark of 115 and 210 in 1932.

Home-Town Vote Balances Defeat

Support By Neighbors Removes Disappointment In Losing

"Well worth it, even if I lose," was the comment of Archie G. Leonard, Farmington's candidate for the Republican nomination for State Legislature, when he returned the first election returns Tuesday night. They were from his home precincts in Farmington City and Township.

Even Surprises Friends Farmington City returns showed that Leonard surprised even his most optimistic supporters with better than a 17 to 1 plurality over his nearest opponent, Melvin H. Lee, the incumbent, whose victory was not assured until first returns Wednesday morning gave him a plurality in the County over Leonard, 3423 to 2251. Harry Spencer ran third with 1817 votes.

MAN IN ACCIDENT 2 MONTHS AGO HAS 3 CHARGES TO FACE

How many times did you see the law of the state? The man who was in an accident of will J. Jones, whose automobile was found guilty of the last week would seem to bear him out.

Gaining his freedom from Oakland County Jail only last Friday after having served 90 days for having been found guilty of drunk driving following an automobile accident in which he was involved June 16, Jones was faced with two additional charges growing out of the same accident. Added to the first charge, which Jones had already scratched off the County's books, were additional ones of reckless driving and unlawfully driving away an automobile.

All three complaints were signed by different individuals. An Oakland County police officer assigned the first, Henry Richards, of Wayne, preferred the second charge against him and Charles Taylor, Route 1, Farmington, owner of the automobile Jones was driving, was the instigator of the third charge.

Jones was arraigned recently in Farmington Justice Court at the third charge. He was tried on both charges, the second one being dismissed. Acting as his own attorney he succeeded in having the charge reduced from a felony to a misdemeanor and was given 90 days probation.

YEARS PROJECTS OUTLINED BY HOME EXTENSION AGENT

Projects for the coming year have been announced by Leonard at a home demonstration at Walled Lake.

The majority of the clubs have chosen home furnishings as their project for the year, Miss Leonard said, so that the one which will be offered in the various training centers. It is a charge that has never been offered in the State before so there will be no danger of repetition for those who have been in extension work before, she asserted. On the other hand, those who have not had home furnishing work before need not feel that they are ineligible to pursue this course for there are no prerequisites, she said.

The subjects of the lessons are announced as follows:

1. Recognizing suitable furniture.
2. Block printing fabrics.
3. Using decorative accessories.

5. Arranging flowers.

For those who prefer the co-operative projects, a training class will be held in Pontiac but not in any of the other training centers. It is not possible to let any group take both projects nor can the course be supplied with bulletins and other illustrative material.

The subjects of the lessons in the project are as follows:

1. Bringing clothes up to date.
2. Putting fun in family living.
3. Reconstructing old furniture.
4. Making the farm feed the family.
5. Home-made supplies that save money.

Election Returns

Show Farmington Still Republican

Farmington Voters Follow Closely Political Trend Throughout State And County

Farmington's three voting precincts, especially the two in the Township, kept step with drastic falling off in voter turnout which seemed general throughout the County and State at the General Primary Election Tuesday. The total vote cast in the three precincts, in an election that went strongly Republican, was 300 less than that of 1932.

Preference for candidates in the Farmington polling places closely paralleled the final results, with only one or two exceptions, the main one being the candidacy of Archie G. Leonard, who won by overwhelming pluralities in this section but lost in the district.

Farmington City cast 228 Republican ballots and 37 Democratic; Precinct 1 Farmington Township, 176 Republican and 41 Democratic; and Precinct 2, 122 Republican and 60 Democratic. The Republican totals in Precinct 1 were an even 100 less than in 1932 while the Democratic turnout was proportionately lower.

The total vote cast in the City and Township was 644, 526 Republican and 188 Democratic. Total votes cast in 1932 was 963, 748 Republican and 220 Democratic.

Farmington fell in line with the rest of the State in giving Frank D. Fitzgerald wide pluralities in all precincts in his successful campaign for the gubernatorial nomination. The incumbent, William A. Constock, carried two precincts, losing the first in the Township, another instance in which Farmington did not go along with the rest of the State. In the three precincts, Constock tallied 71 to Lacy's 51.

Leonard Vote Heavy Although not turning out in heavy numbers, those who did gave Archie G. Leonard handsome pluralities over Melvin H. Lee and Harry Spencer for State Representative in all precincts. Leonard tallied 891 to Lee's 64 and Spencer's 50, but it was not enough to balance the heavier Lee support in the Royal Oak area. Lee won the Royal Oak area over Leonard by about 1200 votes.

Other winners were George A. Dondero and Charles P. Webster, Congress; David G. Pence and Arthur H. Rogue, State Representative; Reynolds and Bernard F. Schradler, sheriff; Lynn Allen and Vincent E. Boyle, county clerk; Charles Sparks and Alfred G. Cramer, State Representative; Earl L. Phillips and Norman C. Orr, circuit court commissioners; and J. Lee Voorhees and C. Dewey Kimball, coroners.

Department Of State Is "Clearing House"

The Department of State is a "clearing house" for information relative to state government. Despite the manifold duties entrusted to the department by law, every mail brings strange requests for information. These requests concerning the proper procedure in cases where workers fail to receive PWA checks, or where the worker feels that there is some irregularity concerning the work in each case, the request is referred to the proper department.

Other recent requests ask for information concerning the height of high tension wires; if notaries public can perform marriage ceremonies; if the State issues peddler's licenses. One of the strangest requests received in recent weeks called for information concerning Congressional districts in Alaska.

Game Law Digests Will All Be New

The 1934-1935 digest of Michigan's general game laws will be new in every way. For the first time it will carry illustrations. A full page is devoted to pictures of three upland game birds on which shooting is permitted in season, the ruffed grouse, sharp-tailed grouse and prairie chicken. Another page has illustrations of protected ducks, the bufflehead and hooded merganser, woodcock, to aid hunters in their identification.
