

## Township Soon to Have Water

The work of putting in service connections to homes using water in the new Farmington Township water system will be started either by the end of this week or the first part of next week, according to Chris Nelson, contractor. All mains must be chlorinated before connections can be made. Several mains south of Grand River avenue have already been treated and homes in that area will be the first to get the service.

Both Mr. Nelson and Bruce Buchanan, consulting engineer on the project, were present at a meeting of the Township Board Tuesday evening to answer questions asked by prospective water users. Buchanan stated that it has been estimated that, with a normal growth, the system will be paid for within 10 to 15 years. Cost to each user will be \$3.00 per quarter.

The resignation of Mrs. Elsto McCullough from the Township Library board was received. Mrs. McCullough has acted as treasurer of the board for the last three years. A resolution to accept Mrs. McCullough's resignation was laid on the table until the board's next meeting.

## Plat Accepted

A supervisor's plat of West Franklin Estates, located near North Farmington, was accepted by the board. The plat had received the approval of the Oakland County Road Commission.

The board received an application to construct a trailer court near the corner of Incker and Shawanaw roads. Opposition to the court was voiced by several residents of that vicinity present at the meeting. The board declared that state law has jurisdiction over trailer establishments and that if the owners of the court met all requirements of the statute it would then be up to the board to accept or reject the application.

## Clyde Button May Enter Army as Second Lieutenant

Clyde Button, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Button of Farmington Township, and graduate of Walled Lake High School with the class of 1935, may be one of the next young men of the community to enter Uncle Sam's service. However, he'll go as an officer, not as just a private.

A second lieutenant's commission was conferred on Button Saturday morning, June 14, at the annual commencement day review or combined forces of the Michigan State College Reserve Officers Training Corps unit.

One of his senior R.O.T.C. students presented with reserve commissions in the United States Army by Major General Charles H. Bonesteel, commander of the Sixth Corps Area, Clyde received his commission from Lt. Col. A. J. Zerbee, head of the Michigan State College R.O.T.C. unit.

The same day he was graduated from M.S.C. with a Bachelor of Science degree in mechanical engineering. Following his major field, Button was a member of the college chapter of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers with a purpose to bring about a closer relationship among mechanical engineering students.

Combining engineering with scholarship, he also belonged to Tau Beta Pi, national engineering honorary made up of junior and senior men who stand scholastically in the upper fifth of their class.

In the extra-curricular field Button has devoted most of his time to R.O.T.C. work and related activities. As an advanced student in the coast artillery, he is a member of the club whose purpose is to bring all advanced artillery military students into a unified body. Button also was a member of Mortar and Ball, national coast artillery honorary, made up of students in the coast artillery.

As co-captain of this year's rifle team, he participated in 63 inter-collegiate matches and received a sweater and numerals award.

He also was a member of the Michigan State College chapter of the Phi Kappa Phi honor society, whose purpose is to stimulate a dynamic fellowship through Christian living.

Graduation from college isn't the only important event that has happened to Button during the past two weeks. Saturday, June 7, he was married to Miss Helen E. Stophmeyer, daughter of her first marriage.

For several summers Button has worked with his brother, J. Russell Button in the Orchard Equipment Company on Haggerty and 12 Mile Road. Last summer he worked for C. A. Sherwin, Illinois. With all his other activity he had time back in 1937 to completely remodel the Button home.

Although hoping to do aeronautical engineering, Button expects that Uncle Sam's Army might have a use for him, perhaps in the July draft. It may be as a second lieutenant in the army or it may be in some stage of defense industry for which he is trained.

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## Injuries Fatal to Mrs. Himmelspach

Mrs. Theresa Himmelspach died early Thursday morning, from injuries received in an automobile accident last Friday. Mrs. Himmelspach, the wife of Joseph Himmelspach, prominent Farmington dentist, an owner of the Farmington Dairy, passed away in Xenia Hospital, Xenia, Ohio.

Cause of death was an injury to the spinal column at the base of the neck. Doctors had held out only a slim hope of recovery, although Mrs. Himmelspach's condition was somewhat improved shortly before her death.

The Himmelspachs, with their two daughters, Theresa and Mary, were enroute to Atlanta, Georgia, to attend the International Kiwanis club convention. The accident occurred about five miles out of Xenia when Mr. Himmelspach was forced off the highway to avoid two oncoming cars. In attempting to get back on the slippery highway, the car slipped over and came to rest against an embankment. There was no heavy crash and the car was almost undamaged, reports said, but the jaw snapped Mrs. Himmelspach's head forward, dislocating the vertebrae at the base of the neck. She suffered no other injuries and the other three occupants were unhurt.

Vertebrae Replaced

Paralyzed from the neck down, Mrs. Himmelspach was rushed to the Xenia Hospital, where for a time doctors gave her only a short while to live. However a specialist was called in from Dayton and after the dislocated vertebrae was replaced, a little more hope was held.

Mrs. Himmelspach never lost complete consciousness and was able to talk to her husband and children. The Himmelspachs' son, Tony, was called from Camp Shelby, Mississippi, where he is receiving military training, and arrived Monday.

Her condition became suddenly worse Wednesday night and she passed away shortly after two o'clock Thursday morning.

The body is to be brought back to Farmington for services here. Information regarding time and place of services was not available up until Thursday afternoon.
