15. Probable increase in taxes in the area to be annexed in relation to the benefits expected to accrue from annexation;
16. Financial ability of the annexing municipality to maintain urban type services in the area;
17. General effect upon the entire community of the proposed action;
18. Relationship of the proposed action to any established city, village, township, county or regional land use plan.
The Boundary Commission will not reach any conclusions or make any determinations until after the October 20, 1971, public hearing. The Commission has several options available. They can deny the petition, approve it as submitted or approve it with boundary adjustments.

party. A lot of emotion and a lot of talk can do a lot of harm.
Others, however, expressed fear of the board's reacting too long to act, of a need to let legislators know of parents' feelings, and of loss of local control of schools.
However, Trustee Kenneth Perrin told the parents: "Just because the board hasn't gone on record by saying anything officially, I hope you don't think we are doing nothing and don't have an opinion.
"I imagine you can all draw a conclusion from the fact that we are all following the situation closely and having discussions with other districts. Talking with other districts indicates some feeling."
COMMENTING later, Supt. Richard Smith described the district's attitude as "interested, concerned, sharp-eyed, calm and collected, and well organized."
He emphasized that "Farmington has for many years endorsed the community school concept, and there is no indication at the present time that it is leaving that philosophy."
At the same time, he said, the public must recognize that the crossing of school boundary lines has some precedent, in such fields, for example, as vocational education, special education, and for sports events.
"Who has bussed students to the Walled Lake schools center and to other districts for special education classes they offer and have accepted their students for classes we offer and they do not," Dr. Smith said.
"His both helps and hinders us" in opposing bussing, he said. "If we have bussed for these educational purposes, for what other purposes might we not have to bus?"
HOWEVER, he also pointed out that student participation in the types of bussing already undertaken has always been with parental consent.
"We have never, and I assume cannot, force a kid to go to a special class, say, for the blind in another district," Smith said. "Most parents are tickled to death for us to provide his transportation."
"But if the parent says 'no,' we would abide by that. But say Johnny comes in to a class and we say he shouldn't be there and he becomes a rip roaring brat, we might even suspend him if it had to be."
"it's a hard line to take with a guy, a third grader. But I excluded a third grader, not in Farmington, under those circumstances one time and the board of education expelled him. In philosophy, we get a parent's consent to cross boundaries; that is, the voluntary act of the parents."
