Will New Eatery Congest Traffic?

FARMINGTON Developers wanting to locate a landmark restaurant at Grand River and Mayfield seem to be winning their argument that the business would not cause an undue traffic burden on Grand River.

A study supporting location of the restaurant was given the Farmington City Council Monday night.

At the same meeting, councilmen also approved the assessment roll for construction of a parking lot on the north side of Grand River; approved rate increases for water service installations; and appointed John Courville to the zoning board of appeals.

ON DEC. 20 the Landmark developers appeared before the Farmington City Council to present a study prepared by Samuel Walker, traffic engineer.

Walker presented statistics to show that the restaurant traffic, if properly routed, would not create traffic hazards.

The council asked its traffic consultant, Tapan Datta of Goodell, Grievias and Associates, to test Walker's findings and report back.

Datta's report was given the council Jan. 3, and it basically supported the findings of Walker. Both traffic reports will be passed on to the planning commission for its Jan. 10 meeting.

The planning commission had recommended denial of site plan on the basis of traffic congestion. The council has agreed to make a decision at its Jan. 17 meeting after the planners have weighed the two traffic reports.

THE COUNCIL last week appointed John Courville to the city's Zoning Board of Appeals to fill the unexpired term of Delos Hamlin, who resigned.

Courville, an unsuccessful council candidate in the last election, is owner of the Ebenezer Shop in the city and husband of Anne Courville, who serves on the city's historical preservation committee.
