Considerable damage, including overturned buildings, broken utility lines and windows and many uprooted trees, resulted.

The center of the storm in the local area was along Grand River Avenue, from School Street, past the Farmington Lumber and Coal Company.

Several awnings in the business district were torn down, and one of the large front windows at the Conroy Market was blown out.

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Another report came in of lightning coming into a house on Farmington Road south of Grand River.
