Dog Ban Becomes State-Wide

Fewer Dogs Reported In Farmington Area

Chief of Police Joseph Drivinski stated that the statistics are cooperating very well, in keeping their dogs at home. Already the number of dogs at large in the city has been greatly reduced, and if everyone continues to cooperate as well as they have in the past, it will be possible to keep an accurate check on the dog situation has spread throughout the state, and all police officers have been instructed to eliminate any stray dogs in the community. Section 5246 of Compiled Laws of 1929, provides that on the 15th of each year the county treasurer shall make a comparison of his records of dogs licensed and determine and locate all unlicensed dogs. Such dogs are declared by the Act to be a public nuisance. The treasurer shall file all such unlicensed dogs with the prosecuting attorney and sheriff of his county and to the State Commissioner of Agriculture. On receiving the name of the owner of an unlicensed dog, the prosecuting attorney shall commence proceedings against the owner as the Act provided; and it is the duty of the sheriff or any member of the State Constabulary to locate and kill, or cause to be killed all such unlicensed dogs.

Charles F. Taylor, Commissioner of the Department of Agriculture, this week issued a statement to all State, County, Municipal and Township police officers, asking their help in curbing the stray dog menace. He said that times are such that every precaution must be taken by the authorities to prevent damage being done by the illegal running at large of dogs, especially damage to the Victory Garden Program and livestock. He asked that all police officers use every and all proper means for the enforcement of the above mentioned statute.

FOUR LOCAL BOYS NAMED TO ATTEND BOYS' STATE

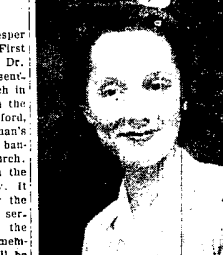
