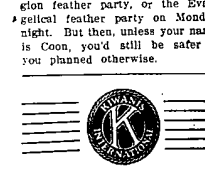

Farmington's power-packed football juggernaut climaxed an unbeaten, untied season last Friday, by coming from behind to score a sensational victory over an inspired Redford Union eleven in a thrill packed saga of the gridiron.

The Falcons, victors in seven starts this season, were heavily favored to win handily over the twice beaten Panthers of Redford, but the visitors held a 12-2 margin late in the third period, making the outlook for the Falcons as dark as the long hanging wind-stark as the clouds when they played. The 'Blue and White' were entirely outclassed for nearly three periods of the game and appeared doomed for certain defeat. Suddenly, in the closing moments of the third quarter, the Falcons, who had been caught on fire and Redford Union found itself unable to extinguish their flame for the remainder of the contest. Farmington never quit once during the entire game, thus proving to a shivering crowd that it is a true champion--even if it is a little out of sync. The Falcons never really recovered from that early fumble, leaving their power dormant for the entire first half. Meanwhile, the super-charged, inspired Panthers picked up their momentum and pushed around with ridiculous ease. The first period ended in a scoreless tie, but it was very apparent that the Falcons had their work cut out for them if they were to notch another victory in their football 'scaps.'

The teams changed goals for the second period, giving Farmington the wind advantage. The game continued to be a punting duel until the middle of the quarter, when the first real thrill of the game occurred. Redford intercepted a Falcon punt on its own 25 yard line. At this point Redford's rough and ready tailback, Bill Hobbs, brought the crowd up with a roar by going 75 twisting, turning yards for an electrifying play and score to give Redford Union a 6-0 lead.

With 3 minutes remaining in the period, Ronnie Bacon shot a bullet pass to sophomore end Don Ferguson, who went 65 yards in a tight rope sideline dash that had the local fans standing on their respective ears. Ferguson, apparently away for a score, was tackled from behind on the three yard line, where he fumbled with Redford Union recovering. Redford Union attempted to punt out of danger, but a bad pass went out of the end zone, giving the Falcons a safety and 2 points, but leaving Redford Union in the lead at half time, 6-2.

As the teams returned to the somewhat soggy and slippery gridiron to resume the second half, a feeling of tenseness and expectancy seemed to filter through the crowd. Farmington kicked off to start the second half, with Redford returning to their own half. The Falcons on the first play, the versatile Mr. 'Hipity' Hobbs shook himself loose into the Falcons' secondary and had to be brought down from behind at the Farmington 20 yard line--but only after scampering 55 yards in a rather spine-tinting play. Hobbs continued to do the ball botting for Redford Union; a few moments later he plunged over from the one yard line in a bone crushing drive to give the visitors a 12-2 lead. Trailing at this point, the Falcons began to unleash their pent-up fury.
