For one week, from March 8 through the 17th, there will be someone at the Theatre each evening to take contributions. Residents are urged to make their contributions as early as possible. Workers have been assigned to various streets and sections, and will call at your home early in the drive. It is hoped to have a complete list of these workers to publish next week. Thus, if you are not at home when they call, you may be able to contact the worker in your area, and make your contribution.

Remember that is the work of volunteers in the 3700 chapters in the United States which has made it possible for Red Cross to care for the soldiers and sailors of America in times of war. The Red Cross is serving in every theater of war and with every command. Red Cross workers are on duty at scores of outposts over the world, are giving aid to wounded men in hospitals in and out of the United States. In addition to all this war-time activity, the Red Cross has not relaxed its traditional service to humanity in time of disaster.

In a letter recently received by Joe Himmelspach from his son, Tony, was the following paragraph: "I can give you a little love down on things here. We are in a city in the Philippines and we are running a hospital for civilians. Things here have been pretty bad for a long time and it is hard work to take care of them. All the boys in the outfit have really been doing their share to help the people here. It is a pleasure to do some work like that and know that it is really appreciated by everyone. I am sure all the fellows feel the same way about it as I do."
