EDITORIALS

Let's Keep It

Undoubtedly we've all had the experience, if not personally at least through a relative or close friend, of looking for a new house, and after hunting and hunting, finally returning to one's present abode, and thinking, "This is pretty good. I'd be foolish to leave."

This reminds one of some people who are looking for an improvement on the traditional American way of life. If they're wise, they'll take a good look at what they have and say, "I'll keep it!"

This begins right at home. Take Farmington, for instance. Walk slowly up and down the streets about town, noting the stable, solid look of the friendly homes, their neat, well kept appearance, and the lovely old trees shading the entire street. It's nice to be able to greet the people you meet, calling them by their first name, and inquiring about members of their family, mentioning mutual friends. It's nice, too, to be able to go into the stores in Farmington's business district, and have the proprietor or his helper call out a cheery greeting, making you feel that you "belong". We enjoy so many comforts and benefits, living here in Farmington, that are unknown not only in cities of other countries, but possibly even in similar cities right here in the United States. Don't overlook that fact.

We can look at Farmington—and we can look at America—and say, "It's not perfect." But we can look again and add, "It's the best any country has ever been able to do — and it's pretty darn wonderful!"

As somebody put it, our form of society has combined liberty and groceries better than any form of government ever conceived by man.

So, if our house — or our city, or country — isn't perfect, let's see what we can do to improve it. But let's not give it up lightly. We'd never find anything to compare.

A Bond For Victory

The Seventh War Loan Drive has been extended for seven days. That gives us a chance to still put Farmington "over the top" — if we all do our best.

Our quota was higher this time than ever before — higher because there will be but two War Loan Drives during 1945, instead of the usual three each year. Farmington residents have done very well — they've subscribed over \$100,000 in Series E Bonds to date. But very well is not good enough this time.

WE HAVEN'T BEATEN the Japs — yet. And we need continued buying of War Bonds to do it. We've a one-front war to win now, but just because you may think it is a lightened task it may turn out to be a much harder one than it has to be. Beating the Japs is no push-over, at best, and if you let up now, buying fewer War Bonds than you might, taking time away from the job, directing your efforts in other lines than winning the war — then you might wake up some day to realize just what a tough job beating the Japs is, only by that time it might be too late. Maybe your brother or friend has already paid with his life, just because you failed to do your part.

Buy those Bonds, and let's put Farmington over its quota in the Seventh War Loan Drive. It can be done.

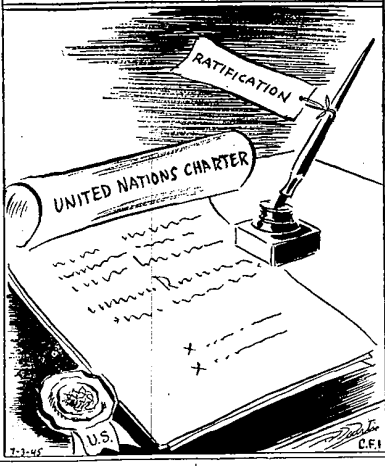
BITS OF THIS AND THAT

TEN YEARS AGO (July 18, 1935)
Board Votes Kindergarten
 Increased tuition rates, together with the addition of a Kindergarten class to the Farmington public school system, are the two important changes which will go into effect in September as the result of the annual meeting of the School Board of District No. 5 held last Thursday in Farmington High School.

Oakland County Dogs Quarantined
 Under dog quarantine provisions effective in Oakland County July 2 to September 25, inclusive, owners of dogs are prohibited from letting them run at large or take them from the County without written permission from the Commissioner of Agriculture or his authorized representatives.

Bondholders Sue School District
 Hearing of two suits filed against the Farmington School District No. 5 by bondholders to compel the District to pay principal and interest on bonds now in default, will be resumed soon, having been recessed by Judge Frank L. Doty of the Oakland County Circuit Court at Pontiac, Monday.

FIVE YEARS AGO (July 4, 1940)
Bank To Install New Deposit System
 A new system whereby merchants of Farmington and the surrounding district may deposit money in the Farmington State Bank after regular banking hours will be started next week, according to Howard C. Knickerbocker, cashier. There have been a good many requests for this service from merchants who take in cash and checks during the hours of nights, Sundays and holidays, when the bank is not open to receive the deposits.

City Moves To New Quarters
 City officials were preparing this week to move into their new quarters in the recently acquired City Hall building. Farmington's municipal offices will occupy the white-fronted stone building on Grand River Avenue formerly occupied by the People's State Bank. The building has undergone general repairs and redecoration during the last two weeks in preparation for occupancy by the various city offices.

Board Names Blanchard Supervisor
 Ernest Blanchard is the new Supervisor of Farmington Township, succeeding Arthur P. Cox. Blanchard was appointed to the Supervisor's Post by the Township Board at a special meeting Monday evening. He will serve as Supervisor until after the regular annual election next April.

Island on a circular route back to Charlevoix.
 Erwin Bely, first mate, was at the wheel.

"About the turn of the century High Island was the home of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians," he related. "They lived in log cabins along the small bay at the northern end. The harbor is not a good one, but it does offer shelter under favorable winds. I recall the time when the Indians traveled by water in sailing boats, known as Mackinacs. That was about 1906, as I recall it."

From the marine map, Bely plotted the 75-foot marine-powered boat toward the harbor. We tied up to a floating dock, used to load timber, and after lunch of delicious white-fish, prepared by Emil Pischner, the engineer-chief, Captain Charles J. Allers rowed the party ashore.

Along the semi-circle of the bay was the deserted settlement, about 20 buildings in all. Other than the gulls in the sky, the scene was void of life. The quibble amid the buildings had a haunting fascination. We felt like explorers who had suddenly discovered a forgotten city — the first persons to walk upon the scene.

The air was laden with sweet perfume. Lilacs were just in bloom. Outside of a large barn stood an ancient hand-hewn farm wagon. Inside was an ice cutter for two men, and several wooden sleds for hauling timber.

One of the most unique buildings in the settlement was a seven-sided log stockade, round in appearance, with narrow entrance leading to an inner room. Leading out from the inner room were several bedrooms, all identical in dimensions. A brick chimney was suspended from the roof by iron supports, indicating that dwellers
