Nancy, niece of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Buckingham, and who has been their guest for a week, returned to her home in Detroit Sunday.

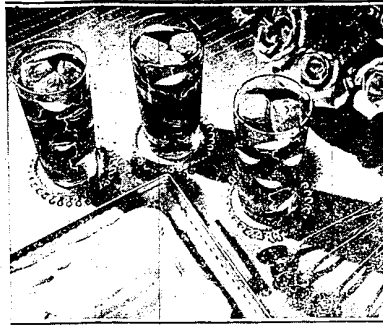
Mr. and Mrs. Cooley, from Hazel Park, were recent callers at the home of their cousins, Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Graham.

Coffee Honey Cake
1/2 cup shortening 1/2 cup sifted flour
1/2 cup honey 1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup dark corn 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
syrup 1/2 teaspoon salt
1 egg 1/2 teaspoon ginger
1/2 cup coffee 1/2 teaspoon allspice

Cream shortening, honey and corn syrup together. Add egg and beat well. Stir in coffee. Sift flour, soda, baking powder, salt, and spices and add all at once to first mixture. Beat about two minutes until batter is smooth. Pour into greased pan 10x8 or 9x9 and bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 40 to 45 minutes. Cool and cover with JELLY FROSTING.

If cake flour is used, increase amount to 2 1/2 cups.

Jelly Frosting
1/2 cup jelly 1 egg white, unbeaten
Dash of allspice 1/2 lb of salt
Measure all ingredients into top of double boiler and set over boiling water. Beat with rotary beater until jelly is free of lumps. Remove from hot water and continue beating until mixture is stiff enough to stand in peaks. Add drop of red coloring, if necessary for color. Frost cake. Serve with a fork because this frosting never becomes entirely hard.

happy recently by the visits of a daughter, who is with the Weas, and a son, Jack, from the Navy.

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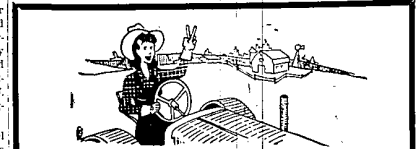
