Postal Notes Available At Lower Cost

Since the Farmington Post Office is now a first class post office, it has been authorized to sell United States Postal Notes. These notes are issued in denominations up to \$10 for a cost of only five cents. Previously only money orders were sold, the rates of which were higher than those of the notes.

Within two months after issue the notes are payable at any post office branch or bank. After the two months have expired, they are redeemable only by making a request for payment to the third postmaster general.

The notes are issued for even dollars up to \$10, and for other amounts stamps are affixed, denoting cent quantities. The postal attendant simply sells the note and the purchaser himself fills out the form.

ALL GIRL SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA TO APPEAR IN CONCERT HERE



Of unusual interest among lovers of music is the announcement issued today by the director of instrumental music at Farmington High School, Lloyd Smith. Bohumir Kryl and his all girl symphony orchestra have been engaged to present one evening concert on Thursday, October 11, at the Farmington High School Auditorium. For the past thirty-eight years and until the end of 1942, Mr. Kryl, Czech conductor, has toured the country with his famous symphony band and orchestra. Since Uncle Sam called most of the

personnel of this orchestra to the armed services, Mr. Kryl inaugurated an innovation in 1943 — an all girl symphony orchestra. Making his debut with the all feminine group consisting of the finest lady concert musicians in the country last September, the orchestra at once became a sensation. Youth, charm and ability, together with the personal direction of Mr. Kryl, created a success. The orchestra has just completed a 22rd state tour, bringing over 100 army camps as well as appearances at scores of col-

leges school and civic organizations. The reception accorded this all girl symphony orchestra was enthusiastic and spontaneous. The excellent program presented by Mr. Kryl and his orchestra at once captivated the thousands upon thousands of music lovers who were fortunate in being able to hear this unusual group.
