RULES COMMITTEE APPROVES DONDERO RESOLUTION

This week Congressman George A. Dondero was one step nearer to success in his drive to secure a complete investigation of the Jaffe case which involves the theft of highly secret military documents from U.S. government files, when he obtained approval of the Committee on Rules for his resolution which would direct the Committee on the Judiciary of the House to make a thorough inquiry into the disposition of the case.

The Dondero resolution now will come before the House for a vote. The inquiry is sought to clear up the mystery surrounding the cases of six persons arrested last June in violation of the Espionage Act. The cases are of a highly sensitive character because of the secret documents charged to have been stolen and the fact that three of the six persons involved held State and Navy department jobs. The individuals involved are Philip J. Jaffe, Kate Mitchell, Mark Gayn; John S. Service and Emmanuel S. Larson of the State Department; and Andrew Roth of the Navy Department. Jaffe was fined \$2,500, another was fined a smaller amount, and the others were released.

John S. Service was named by General Hurley as proposing that the government of Chiang Kai-Shek be permitted to collapse. Subsequently, he was attacked by General MacArthur's staff and it was only recently that a smear campaign on General MacArthur was launched by American Communists. This whole chain of circumstances, Congressman Dondero contends, should be thoroughly investigated that the people may know the extent and the nature of Communist influence and infiltration in high government circles.

In a speech on the floor of the House (November 23), Rep. Dondero voiced his opinion that confidential information relating to the War with the Jaffes had been transmitted through the Jaffe group, to the Chinese Communist delegate to United Nations Conference in San Francisco and presented some very convincing evidence to support his conclusions. The resolution for the inquiry was reported out of the Committee on Rules after Congressman Dondero testified that dropping of the charges against four of the defendants and the imposition of small fines on the other two resulted upon the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the circumstances warranted careful scrutiny of the whole affair.

Congressman Dondero contends that a thorough investigation will reveal why the charges were dropped and it is expected that names of additional persons who participated in the disposition of the documents will be disclosed. "The whole thing has been whitewashed. It smacks of the influence of radical elements within our Government," Congressman Dondero asserts.

RED CROSS NEWS

Much interest is being shown in the Red Cross Home Nursing course which is at present being taught in Farmington High School. This program is also being conducted in Senior High Schools at Lake Orion, Oxford, Pontiac, Birmingham, Madison high school, Clawson and Royal Oak. Many superintendents have requested this course and in many instances an arrangement is made with Home Economic teachers to instruct part of the course and a graduate nurse gives the instruction in nursing procedure.

Every instructor is a Red Cross Nurse and the Home Nursing committee of the Oakland County Chapter of which Mrs. Hugh Little is chairman, feels that each nurse who instructs a class is making a great contribution to the community. In schools which are enrolled in Junior Red Cross Junior members have an opportunity to participate.

Free Swimming Classes Given Boy Scouts

"Every Scout A Swimmer" is a slogan which every boy and leader hopes will come true. Fortunately in this part of the country it is not necessary to wait for summer in order to learn swimming and life saving. Many of our schools have pools; and there are pools in other public institutions such as Boys Clubs, the Y's, and Recreation Centers in which many boys learn to swim.

The pool in this area is located at the Redford School and free instructions are given every Friday night. The instructor is William Legowsky.

Among the six hundred or more Scout Councils of the nation, few are so fortunate as the Detroit Area Council in having easy access to swimming opportunities and trained instructors.

Because of a splendid plan of cooperation between the Detroit Board of Education and the local Scout organization, many Detroit School Pools are available, at least one night a week, for Scout swimming and life saving. Similar plans exist between the local Council and other Boards of Education — such as in Highland Park, Hamtramck, Royal Oak.

In these pools, Red Cross trained Scoutleaders are available every week, to give special coaching and instruction in the many, health-building art of swimming and life saving. These Scout-Swimming instructors are members of the American Red Cross Life Savings Corps No. 5, the only group of its kind in the country. Corps No. 5 of the Detroit Chapter American Red Cross, was organized on October 11, 1927 by Scoutleaders who were technically qualified and genuinely interested in helping Scouts to secure their swimming and life saving achievements.

In order to qualify for First Class rank a Second Class Scout must swim at least 50 yards. Then in order to qualify for Scouting's top award — Eagle Rank — a Scout must have both swimming and life saving merit badges. Now boys who advance this far along the Scouting Advancement Trail also achieve their Red Cross Junior Life Saving and Water Safety Award and eventually when in enough — 17 years of age or over
