Decorations of red and white emphasized the autographed hands of seniors. Refreshments of pop and cupcakes were served. N.S.

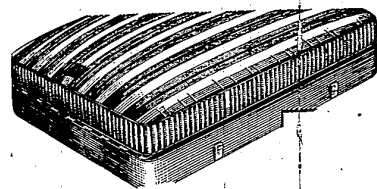
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
